TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Genoa, May 10th. Monsignor Pizzardo Deputy secretary of state for the Vatican, explained to the Associated Press this evening that the suppositions, circulating in conference circles, that the Holy See was ready to abandon its claim for the restitution of church property in Russia, was incorrect.

London, May 11th.—A despatch to the "Evening Standard" from Genoa says that if the French and Belgians leave the conference, Mr. Lloyd George will remain and try and work the ship to port with a short-handed crew.

London, May 11th.—Sir Robert Horne, speaking at the annual dinner at the bankers-association last night, said he was glad to think that at the end of this, his first year as head of the treasury, he found himself in a position which was incomparably better in many respects than that to which he had succeeded. He was then confronted with very great financial difficulties but these had been mitigated and he was assured also that bankers found themselves in a very much easier position than that with which they were confronted a comparatively short time ago. All apprehension concerning the decadence of the city of London had entirely disappeared, continued Sir Robert, and if it had not been for the strike in the engineering industry, he would have said that the country was due for a distinct business revival this year. From all the symptoms in trades in the United Kingdom he believed there was still a good prospect for a revival of business, although not in the same degree, he thought the country might look forward to seeing, before very long, a revival, which would bring encouragement to everybody and give business a fresh start, thus bringing about a period of prosperity.

Genoa, May 12th. On behalf of the British delegation Sir Edward Grigg, commenting on the Russian reply last night, said it was just the sort of empty politics which the Bolsheviks always produce and which makes negotiations with them almost impossible, and all these pages of argument were worth about as much as the paper money which is the chief production of the Russian revolution. When you get to the end, he said, you arrive at the real substance of the documents, which is a question of reciprocity.

Genoa, May 12th. Great Britain has proposed a truce for Eastern Europe on the basis of the de facto frontiers, pending the conclusion of an enquiry by a commission to be appointed, it was announced this afternoon.

Genoa, May 12th. The fate of the Genoa conference may be settled today in Paris, in the opinion of many of the delegates, and the decision of M Poincare on the Russian reply to the Allied memorandum is awaited here with the utmost anxiety. Mr. Lloyd George and Signor Schanzer have used all their influence with M. Barthou to impress him that the Russian note, although not as favourable as was hoped, still leaves the door open for profitable discussion and perhaps for a general agreement and they have urged him to reflect this opinion in his despatches to the Premier.

London, May 13th. Mr. Kearns, the boxing promoter has informed the Associated Press that an agreement has been reached with M. Descamps for a Carpentier-Dempsey match, which is either to take place in London or Paris before next May.
