TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Panama, Aug. 22nd.—Cable messages sent by the Panamanian Govt. to Washington with the view of ascertaining the United States Govt.'s attitude towards Panama resistance to Costa Rican occupation of Coto have not been answered. Armed men to the number of 150 have been ordered to proceed to Coto from David. They will take with them 10 machine guns which were purchased in the United States last April. The Secretary of Govt. and Justice Senior Alfrado has given orders to the Chief of Police to hold the entire Police force of Panama and Colon in readiness to march to Coto. Identical orders have been sent to the heads of Police forces in interior towns. Mayors have been ordered to revise their volunteer lists and to advise

those men to be ready for any emergency.

Washington, Aug. 22nd.—Bids of \$2-100 each for 205 wooden ships submitted by the Ship construction and trading Corps. of New York have been accepted by the Shipping Board, it is announced officially. Commissioner Plummer said the Board had devoted a great deal of time to the study of the bids in view of "the terribly low prices which were offered for part of the fleet." The vessels cost the Board from three hundred thousand to eight hundred thousand a piece. As to the vessels retained, Commissioner Plummer explained that the shipping Board was considering the possibility of their utilization as pontoons for the proposed bridge across the Hudson River at New York City.

New York, Aug. 22nd.—Gold coin and bullion which arrived from India and Great Britain on Saturday on the Cunarder "Aquitania" are reported by the Wall Street journal to be valued at \$6,000 000. There were 225 boxes in all of which 115 were from India and 110 from Great Britain.

Washington, Aug. 22nd.—According to a crop expert here the states along the Canadian border from New York as far West as the Rockies will have unusually poor crops this year owing to the excessive weather and drought of the past Summer, especially in June and July. North Western New York farmers fear their yields, excepting corn, will be 20 percent below the ten year average.

Washington, Aug. 22nd.—Formal acceptance by the British Govt. of the invitation to participate in the Washington conference on limitation of armament and Far Eastern questions was received today by Mr. Hughes. The note of acceptance was transmitted by Ambassador Harvey and was delivered to him by Lord Curzon.

Belgrade, Aug. 22nd.—The funeral of the late King Peter was held today in the presence of vast throngs of the people. Perfect order was maintained throughout the City during the ceremonies.

Paris, Aug. 22nd.—King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia, who has been suffering from appendicitis was still bedridden today. He has not yet been pronounced out of danger, although the bulletins issued by the attending physicians continue to be hopeful.

Kingston, Jca., Aug. 22nd.—Arrangements are being made to send a deputation to London to urge the granting of a wider measure of representative Govt. in Jamaica. The colonists are not favourable to federation with Canada, but are clamouring for a Govt. of the people.
