ST. CROIX STATION.

Trinidad, Oct. 18th.—The Hon. T. A. V. Best, C. M. G., the newly appointed Colonial Secretary, arrived yesterday from England by R. M. S. "Quillota" and was sworn in at an Executive meeting to his substantive post. Following on that he took the oath of office as Acting Governor of the Colony, thus relieving the Hon. W. Gordon who goes on leave. The Hon. W. Walcott, C. M. G., will continue to act as Colonial Secretary until the arrival of His Excellency Sir John Chancellor early next month.

London, Oct. 16th.—Mr. Stuart Bunning, Secretary of the Postmen's Federation, who presided over the recent Glasgow Trades Union Congress, informed the Associated Press today that the Executive of the Miners' Union would soon undertake nation-wide propaganda backed by the entire body of British labour to acquaint the public with the reason why the labour unionists were insisting upon nationalization of the mines. The attempt will be to show that the state ownership upon the basis demanded, would be beneficial alike to the state, to the consumers and the workers. It is hoped thus, Mr. Bunning explained, to avoid the alternative of a resort to direct action or other drastic means of enforcing the pledge given by the Glasgow Congress to "compel the Government" to adopt the majority report of the Sankey Commission recommending the nationalization of the mines. A deputation of Labour interests recently visited Downing Street and were met there with a refusal on the part of Govt. to accede to the miners' demands, and a recurrence of labour difficulties similar to the railwaymen's strike, has been regarded as possible. ing statement however served to dispel this idea. "There is nothing in the present labour situation likely to result in serious trouble in the near future," said Mr. Bunning. He expressed the belief that the Washington Labour conference to attend which, he will leave on Saturday, will put a new mediation on many issues affecting labour in all countries.

Montevideo, Oct. 16th.—The Uruguayan House of Representatives today voted approval of the Treaty of Peace between the Allied and Associated Powers and Germany.

Washington, Oct. 16th.—The Senate today voted down an amendment to the Peace Treaty under which German rights in Shantung would revert to China instead of Japan. The vote on the amendment which had been presented by Chairman Lodge of the Foreign Relations Committee was 35 to 55.

Washington, Oct. 16th.—By an overwhelming majority the House today passed the bill extending for one year the war time passports restrictions so as to keep radicals and undesirable aliens out of the United States.
