TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Madrid, July 3rd.—It is officially announced that the Spanish army in Western Morocco has been attacked along the whole line of the Tetuan sector by Moors coming from the districts of Riff and Gomarau. The communique does not give the exact number of losses, but the Moors lost more than 100 killed on Tuesday. The Spanish army was assisted by bombing planes over the Moorish lines. The importance of this engagement is in the fact that the Western Morocco district has been peaceful for years and the outbreak of the rebellion there aggravates the situation by compelling the Spanish to fight all along the line, with the exception of Raisulis district behind Tangier. The directorio, has issued an official note to the press as follows. "The directorio anxious to inform the public opinion on all things which interest it, does not wish to conceal now that the state of affairs in the Western Zone of Morocco is aggravated sensibly by the rebellion of several tribes and by the presence of larger detachments of Riffian and Gomarau tribesmen in plateau Bau, which makes provisioning and communications with the Spanish troops difficult. To restore normality, our troops are attacking the Moorish positions all along the line". It is reliably reported that general Berenguer, who was removed from service by a decree of the Supreme Court martial, will be pardoned and restored to command in Morocco by order of General Primo De Rivera.

Henley-on-Thames, July 5th.—The Leander Eight, stroked by W. P. Mellon, Oxford, won the grand challenge cup of the Henley Regatta today defeating Jesus College, Cambridge, in the final heat by six feet. The Diamond Sculls were won by J. Beresford Jr, a previous winner of this trophy, who captured them in 1920. He had an easy victory today in the final heat, over K. N. Craig of Pembroke College Cambridge.

Wimbledon, England, July 5th.—Miss Wills and Mrs. Wightman, the United States, won the championship in the women's doubles of the Wimbledon lawn tennis tournament today, defeating the British pair Miss McKane and Mrs. Covell in the final match 6-4 6-4.

London, July 5th.—The King will review more than 200 warships at Spithead at the end of July at what is expected to be the finest naval spectacle seen in home waters since the war. At

the last review at Spithead in July 1914 200 warships were at anchor, but the navy then possessed more capital ships than it does today. Among the big ships participating in the July review will be the Queen Elizabeth, the Barham, Malaya, Valiant, Warspite, Revenge, Royal Oak, Resolution, Royal Sovereign, Centurion, Ajax and Thunderer.

Tokio, July 5th.—United Press. The British round the world plane, piloted by Major MacLaren, arrived in Japan today. Thousands of people were along the waterfront at Kagoshima, as the big plane came roaring out from the China coast, and cheered the aviators as their plane settled gracefully on the water. An elaborate programme of entertainment has been prepared for Major MacLaren and his companions.

Madison Square Gardens, July 5th.—On the 71st ballot the leaders stood as follows. MacAdoo 528.5, Smith 333.5, Davis 68. MacAdoo's votes was unchanged from the last ballot, Smith lost one and Davis gained one.

Colombes France, July 5th.—The Eighth Olympic Games in the modern series officially opened in the Colombes Stadium today by Mr. Doumergue, President of the Republic. The formal parade which featured the colorful ceremonies, was started after three o'clock with the South African representatives leading.

Madrid, July 5th.—A demilitarization of the Military Directorate, the governing body of Spain, and a modification of the dictatorial powers of General Primo Rivera President of the Directorate, took place yesterday by Royal decree. The members of the directorate were appointed new portfolios wherein each is responsible to the Crown. He took the oath before the King. Under the decree, General Rivera becomes Minister of Cults and Justice, but remains head of the Cabinet. King Alfonso yesterday signed a decree for a general amnesty, to include sentences imposed in connection with the Spanish disaster in Morocco in July 1921, and political offences and persons imprisoned for newspapers libels. General Primo de Rivera drafted the decree.

Geneva, July 5th.—With simple ceremony the northern half of the famous "Quai Mont Blanc" was yesterday renamed "Quai Wilson." On the garden wall of the League of Nations Palace, overlooking Lake Lemman, had been placed a plain stone tablet which bore the chiselled words "to the memory of Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, founder of the League of Nations," and below, "the City of Geneva."

Paris, July 5th.—The moral pact of continuous collaboration which M. Herriot announced he had brought back from his Chequers Court Conference with the British Prime Minister, seems to be already in a bad way. The most serious point of difference between the

British and the French viewpoints concerns the identity of the body which is to decide when Germany shall have defaulted in her engagements. The French newspapers refuse to admit that the proposals of the Dawes Plan, are outside the Versailles Treaty and declare that the British intention to replace the Reparations Commission by another body is unjustified, as is the British argument that the French cling to the Reparation Commission because they control it. Some of the opposition papers question the possibility now of holding the proposed inter Allied Conference on July 16th. They argue that if the French and British Cabinets cannot adjust their views before that date, they would be unable to do so during the conference and France would run the risk of being exposed to collective pressure and placed in a position of isolation, to which the present situation is preferable. M. Herriot's appearance before the Finance and Foreign Relations Committee of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday lasted three hours. He read the official minutes of the Chequers talks and also the telegram he sent to the British Prime Minister, expressing the surprise he felt at the nature of the memorandum sent by Mr. MacDonald along with the invitations to the proposed inter Allied Conference. Ex-Premier Briand suggested that M. Herriot try to resume the negotiations for signature of a guaranty pact which M. Briand undertook at Cannes. The Premier replied that he had made very pressing efforts in that direction with Mr. MacDonald, but that the political situation had been deeply modified since the conference. British public opinion and Parliament now being hostile to any military agreements.

St. Vincent, July 6th.—Mr. George Corea, prominent merchant and planter ex-Chairman St. Vincent Chamber of Agriculture and Commerce, died here last night at his residence San Souci.
