NATIONAL ANTHEM.

The Native Brass Band rendered a popular concert last night to the enjoyment of a large crowd.

The Danish and American colors were displayed yesterday from the dwellings of Danish residents in this town on the occasion of the favorable result to Denmark of the plebiscite taken in the first zone of the duchy of Schleswig by which that province according to the provisions of the peace treaty will be restored to Denmark after a separation of more than half a century, it having been with the duchy of Holstein ceded to Prussia in 1866 at the termination of the war with that state which, during the 50 years of

German occupation, has unsuccessfully employed the most systematic, drastic, and determined efforts to stamp out Danish aspirations and culture.

Slesvig Reunited With Denmark.

People of Slesvig!

The Day has come; we wish to return home.

That in which Generations have had faith, that for which our Fathers have fought, that for which our Mothers have wept, the Hope, which has carried our Sons through war and death, is now about being fulfilled.

Thus sounded in part the appeal to the People of Slesvig, who in conformity with the Treaty of Versailles should decide the question of their reunion with Denmark.

The Day (not the German "DER TAG") has come and is passed and the question has been answered with: "WE WILL RETURN HOME".

According to cable News which reached here yesterday, the plebiscite taken in virtue of the Versailles Treaty resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of Denmark.

By this vote a part of that territory, which the Prussians and Austrians, after a war bravely fought by the Danes against an overwhelming force of the invading Prussians and Austrians, in 1864 annexed and administered with an iron hand, has now come back to Denmark by a free vote of 75,000 of the inhabitants against but 24,000 or over 75% majority.

Thus has been rectified another of the great injustices committed by the Germans against an unoffending people and another disregard shown for the sacredness of treaties.

After the war with Denmark was ended the Prussians and Austrians could not agree on dividing the spoils, in consequence of which a war between these two Powers took place, resulting in the Peace Treaty at Prague in 1866, by section V. of which treaty it was stipulated that Prussia should annex Holstein and Slesvig, with the exception, however, of the Northern part of Slesvig, the inhabitants of which should decide for themselves by plebiscite, whether they would belong to Denmark or Germany. The latter Power, however, with a supreme indifference as to Treaty stipulations and knowing the feeling of the inhabitants, has never allowed the plebiscite to be taken, and only now, when forced, have had to submit to same.

For taking the plebiscite Slesvig was divided in three Zones, North, Middle and South Slesvig.

On the 29th. of January last the allied Forces occupied and administered the territory, in which the plebiscite was to be held, and which simultaneously was vacated by all German Civil and Military Authorities.

On the 10th inst. the plebiscite was held in the first Zone, and that part was in consequence of the result vacated by the Allied Authorities and handed over to the Danish Authorities.

The next plebiscite will be held in the second Zone on the 7th of March.

A true and loyal people has thus been relieved of German oppression and now return home to their beloved Mother Country.

May the Reunion prove of everlasting happiness and prosperity to both parties.
