ours scrapped, but I know the patriotic spirit which inspired them to build up will also enable them to face the winding up of their enterprises and efforts when the expenditure of the country, as a result of the war debt and war pensions must necessarily be very high, and we must economize ruthlessly in every direction".

Paris, Sept. 15th—Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch, brother of the late Russian Emperor, who made his escape from Perm, where he was imprisoned by the Bolsheviks, has reached Admiral Kolchack's headquarters, according to "Humanite". He is known to only a few of Kolchack's officers, the paper adds, and is preparing to act in the role of pretender to the Imperial throne.

London, Sept. 15th—Lord Fisher, in his concluding article in the "Times" says a period of change is at hand, as sweeping in its character as was either the introduction of steam or the advent of armour, for the fact is unquestioned that aircraft even now is making such prodigious developments, that the only escape for vessels on the surface of the ocean will be to go under the water. These types of vessels instantly require great study, research and much experiment. "We had a submersible carrying a twelve-inch gun before the war ended", he declared. "The very day this twelve-inch gun submersible was ready for battle she heard by her own wireless installation, a message from a far distant sea". Lord Fisher concludes, that an Anglo-American fight is inconceivable and asks, "Cannot the American and English navies dominate the world any time and tell others not to build more or we will fight you here now."

Houston, Texas, September 15th.—Port Aransas, 25 miles from Corpus Christi on the upper end of Mustang Island, was completely demolished by the hurricane on Sunday, according to a wireless message picked up here today, which reads: "Port Aransas Customs Office complete demolished by hurricane and all records lost".

Washington, Sept. 15th.—Great Britain has withdrawn the prohibition on the re-exportation of America cotton from her Dominions. This was reported today by the American Consul General in London.

London, Sept. 15th.—Admiral Kolchak, in pursuing his offensive against the Bolsheviks, has broken their front in three places, according to official information reaching here today. The all-Russian counter-movement, it is stated, threatens, to outflank the Bolshevik forces advancing from Tobosk. A Russian communique received by the War Office says General Kamontove, commander of the anti-Bolshevik Cossacks, who

about the middle of August broke through to the Bolshevik lines, is still operating behind the Bolshevik 100 miles west of Pskov. He has cut the railway, seriously interfering with Bolshevik ammunition and supplies.

London, Sept. 16th.—Sugar in stock on the 13th inst was 154,000 tons. Last year 244,000 tons.
