TELEGRAMS.**ST. CROIX STATION.**

London, Oct. 25th.—Mr. MacSweeney

Lord Mayor of Cork, died at Brixton prison in this city at 5 40 o'clock this morning. His death followed hunger-strike of more than 73 days eclipsing any in the annals of the medical world. MacSweeney who had been unconscious, did not recover his faculties before he died. MacSweeney was unconscious for 36 hours before his death came, it is stated John MacSweeney and the Chaplain who had been waiting downstairs in the Prison were told by Prison Officials at 4.35 o'clock that they should go to the Mayor's bedside as they thought death was approaching. The brother asked for the privilege of communicating with other relatives who were not present but the officials he alleges, refused him the use of a telephone. After the prisoner's death his brother and the Chaplain say they were not permitted to leave Brixton Prison until 6.15 o'clock. Mrs. MacSweeney, accompanied by her parents and the sisters of the Lord Mayor, arrived at Brixton prison at 9.30 o'clock. It is understood that arrangements are being made to take the body to Ireland for burial. News of MacSweeney's death had not become known in the district around Brixton prison until after nine o'clock. The usual large contingent of police was on duty inside the prison grounds to prevent any demonstration but outside and along the road leading to the main highway there were no unusual signs of activity. The cause of MacSweeney's death was heart-failure, according to a statement issued at the Home Office. This state-

ment is considered an indirect answer to the criticisms of Dr. Josiah Oldfield the Physician and Publicist, who had declared it was wrong for the Lord Mayor's doctors to administer meat juice and brandy. He said brandy was a poison and that a man at the point of death was very susceptible to poison. Dr. Oldfield added that when a man fasted for a long time the first food he could endure was fruit juice. With regard to the theological aspects of the Lord Mayor's hunger-strike as to whether it was suicide or not, the Pope has received so many urgent appeals to make some pronouncement regarding this case from persons of opposite view points that he has laid the problem before the Congregation of the Holy Office which settles questions of faith and morals judges heresy. No decision has yet been announced. MacSweeney was 40 years of age. He was elected as a Sinn Fein Member from Cork to Parliament in 1918 but never took his seat. He was elected Lord Mayor of Cork in 1920. For various political offences he had been in jail with brief intervals of liberty since January 1916 and in October 1917 secured his release from jail by hunger-strike.

Cork, Oct. 25th.—Feverish interest in possible developments caused by the death of Lord Mayor MacSweeney of this city which occurred in Brixton Prison this morning, mingled with the grief in which his death plunged many people in South Ireland. Although these people appear stirred to the highest degree of bitterness, it is regarded as extremely improbable that there will be any outbreaks or disorderly demonstrations in this city. It is expected, however, that there will be a considerable extension and intensification of guerilla warfare against the police and military forces who, anticipating reprisals, are doubling their vigilance, especially in remote districts. Cork jail, where a number of hunger-strikers are in grave condition, is guarded inside and outside by soldiers equipped with machine-guns. There is unexceptionally large garrison here. It is equipped for any eventuality, has a number of tanks and armoured cars and is ready for instant service. Military forces are so strong that it is considered improbable that any attempt at force will be made here. It is understood that the Irish Parliament had been making appeals to all elements of the population to refrain from violence. This is only believed to be the policy of various influential leaders of the Sinn Fein movement. Whether such counsels will be followed by the younger element or by members of the Irish Republic Brotherhood, one of the most militant Irish secret societies, remains to be seen.
