

and supplies. He has been shortening his front to create reserve forces in preparation for the offensive which he has expected for the last few days.

Riga, Oct. 31st.—The Lithuanian Govt. is hastily evacuating Kovno and is removing all railway material possible to Shavli and other points of northern Lithuania, as a result of General Zelgonski's insurgent army having broken through the Lithuanian front near the town of Vilkomir, 45 miles northeast of Kovno on Friday evening. General Zelgonski's offensive continues along the whole front and his forces are attempting to surround Kovno and attack it from the rear.

Templemore, Ireland, October 31st.—Templemore on Friday night was the scene [of five hours] of terrorism when military forces raided the town armed with guns, hatchets and other implements. They fired shots and burned premises, but no casualties have been reported. Several jewelry and clothing shops were broken into and looted and after being sprayed with petrol were set on fire. Windows in more than 50 houses were smashed, but the occupants escaped without injury. The proprietors of the burned shops asserted that they were set on fire by 15 men, some of them wearing helmets and masks. Members of the clergy and "Black and Tan" and other policemen helped to put out the flames. Many people left the town fearing further reprisals, others took refuge in the police barracks. Tribute has been paid in some quarters to the policemen and the "black tan" police for their assistance and behaviour during the looting. The raid is supposed to be a reprisal for an attack on an army lorry at Tipperary Thursday when 3 soldiers were killed and 5 wounded.

Constantinople, Nov. 1st.—Anti-Bolshevik forces commanded by Genl. Wrangel are reported to have evacuated Alexandrovsk, an important city on the Dnieper river about 50 miles south of Ekaterinoslav and Berdiansk, a town on the northern shore of the Sea of Azov, as a result of the general offensive that has been launched by the Soviet forces.

Havana, November 1st.—Cuba voted today for a new President and the outcome is awaited with considerable apprehension. The end of the campaign, regarded as the most bitter since the island gained the right to govern its own affairs, found old party lines broken with a right-about-shift in leadership. Platform issues apparently were forgotten in the right for control of the Govt. by Jose Miguel Gomez, Liberal nominee, and Dr. Alfredo Zayas, candidate of the old conservative or coalition party. Gomez is a former president of Cuba and Zayas served under him as vice-president. Vice presidential candidates were Miguel Arrango, Liberal, Francisco Carrillo, Coalition.

New York, Nov. 2nd.—Women voters of the United States went to the polls today to elect a new President for the four years beginning March 4th next.
