

New Items On Postal Affairs;

FURNISHED BY THE POSTMASTER
AT CHRISTIANSTED.

The issue of \$5 war-savings stamps, and thrift stamps was discontinued on December 31, 1921, and their sale ceased on that date.

The 1922 issue of Treasury-savings certificates will take the place of war-savings and thrift stamps, and may be obtained in denominations of \$25; \$100; and \$1000; at \$20; \$80; and \$800 respectively. A new stamp of \$1 denomination, non-interest bearing, known as a Treasury-savings stamp is also for sale, and when 20 of these stamps are affixed to a Treasury-savings card, the same will be accepted in exchange for a \$25 Treasury-savings certificate. All information relative to this subject will be furnished by the postmaster who invites public interest thereto.

The Post Office Department is willing to establish the Postal Savings system at Christiansted if there is any reasonable field for it here. The Postmaster will be pleased to furnish all elucidations as regards its operation, and to hear from any patrons of the office who are interested in this branch of the postal service.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Jamaica, Jan. 11th.—At a special meeting of the Jamaican Imperial Association yesterday Mr. A. W. Farquharson was appointed as representative of Jamaica to proceed to England to place before His Majesty's Government the position of the sugar industry in Jamaica. Mr. Farquharson moved the following resolution which was called unanimously. Cause of trouble:—That this meeting of the Jamaica Imperial Association desire to record its well considered opinion.

(a) That owing to the rapid and abnormal development of Cuba as a sugar producing country there is a temporary over production of sugar having regard to the world's temporary reduction in consumption caused by wide-spread industrial and economic depression and by heavy import duties imposed in consuming countries. That the price of sugar is in consequence below the cost of production.

(b) That sugar production must succumb in those countries that are not helped to survive the crisis either by fiscal protection in the countries of consumption or by powerful financial backing.

(c) That the United States Government by means of the Fordney Emergency Law and otherwise are taking measure to assist sugar producers in the United States and its Colonies to survive the crisis.

(d) That Cuban sugar production has the powerful backing of United States financiers.

(e) That efforts are being made to

secure a market for the Cuban surplus at the expense of producers in Colonies of the British Empire.

(f) That it is essential in the interests of sugar production within the Empire that substantial preference should be granted to sugar produced within the Empire, and that steps should be taken to prevent the dumping Great Britain of surplus sugars from Cuba or elsewhere.

(g) That it is highly desirable that a deputation consisting of a representative from each of the sugar producing Colonies of the Empire should wait on His Majesty's Government to make urgent representation on the subject with a view to obtaining such aid as may be necessary to meet the crisis.

Cannes, Jan. 11th.—The Allied Supreme Council met today to consider Germany's war reparations. The desire of Germany to participate in the consortium which is going to engage in the gigantic enterprise of restoring European countries including Austria and Russia, to normal conditions, is counted upon to overcome any hesitation they might have to subscribe to the Allied new terms. If Germany does not want to abandon her cherished idea of taking a large part in the economic restoration of Russia, she must declare her intention of paying what she owes. The final terms for reparations payments that the German delegation will be asked to accept are 720,000,000 gold marks and repartions in kind to the value of 1,750,000,000 gold marks, annually. France finally renouncing any part of the one billion marks already paid, will get 1,125,000,000 marks of the payment in kind each year, remainder going as follows. 230,000,000 to Italy. 100,000,000 to Great Britain. 125,000,000 to Belgium, 7,000,000 to Japan. The rest goes to other beneficiaries under the treatment of the 720,000,000 gold marks payable in cash in 1922. Great Britain will get 159,000,000 of which she will loan 139,000,000 to France, the loan being repayable from later cash payments by Germany to France. The rest will apply on Belgium's priority. This division applies only to the present year, the idea being that payments in cash be in part applied to payment of interest on series of the German bonds to the value of one billion gold marks, now in the hands of the reparations commission, to secure payment of 519,000,000 marks to Belgium, 45,000,000 to Great Britain and 31,000,000 to Italy.

Washington, Jan. 11th.—The Japanese delegates to the conference today tentatively agreed to the withdrawal of Japanese troops from the former German Kiaochow leasehold and from Tsing Tao Tsinan Fu railway on condition that China furnish proper policing. The delegates did not discuss the date on which the withdrawals would take place.
