EDITORIAL.

We do not know that we are called upon to comment upon Father Daily's letter published in this issue. Although addressed to the editor of the paper, the communication deals with a matter in which we merely acted as spokesman for those who felt that we had been instrumental in exposing the community to an unwarranted attack, and we therefore refer the letter to the interested parties. In allusion however to that part of the article implying that the editorial columns are governed by any individual or individuals, or voice the sentiments of any one person, the reference to similarity in style between Mr. Svendsen's letter and our editorial giving this impression, we are bound to say that such an idea is quite erroneous. As a matter of fact we do not see the similarity and Father Daily does not point it out. The conservative attitude of the "Avis" is too well known locally to require of any argument on this score and in the present instance we happen to know that Mr. Svendsen's letters are translations from Danish while Danish plays no part in our editorial or other notes. As Father Daily remarked in a recent correspondence with Rev. Mayhew, there is in these discussions usually much heat with no light. And this is probably the case here; therefore we welcome a cessation of the hostility which is kept up while controversies last, and would like to assure all concerned that this paper has no partisan feelings whatever as regards the outcome

of literary or other contests that may be carried on in its columns.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

Governor Oman will arrive in Frederiksted on board the "Vixen" about noon next Tuesday the 9th. He will receive those who wish to see him in Judge Noll's office that afternoon from 2 to 4 o'clock.

The detachment of Marines under command of Captain Bartoe will arrive by the "Vixen" at the same time to take Station in Frederiksted.

Governor Oman has received a letter from the Chief of the Weather Bureau in San Juan stating that the Chief of the Weather Bureau in Washington proposes to inaugurate a system of weather observations to embrace all of the islands and contiguous coasts of the Caribbean Sea.

At the present time the Weather Bureau has an organized climatological service in Porto Rico only, but desires to extend this service, as rapidly as practicable, to include selected stations in the Virgin Islands of the United States and in Santo Domingo and Haiti, and later to arrange for cooperation with the authorities in the English and French islands and of Cuba until the entire area of the West Indies is represented in a system of daily observations of temperature, rainfall and other weather conditions.

Weather reports are now being received at the Weather Bureau in San Juan from one station in St. Thomas, which is operated by the Harbormaster, and from one in St. Croix. It is desired however, to open at least one more station on the island of St. Thomas, one on St. John, and five or six more stations on the island of St. Croix.

The weather Bureau will furnish the necessary instruments and forms, and supervise the work of collection and publication of the results. As there is no provision in law for compensation of observers it is necessary to find men or women who are personally interested in the work to take up the duties of the observer. Governor Oman will, as far as practicable, detail from the Government service as many persons as can be spared for this work, which is so essential to the inhabitants of the Virgin Islands, but offers of service on the part of others will be solicited.

The work to be performed by the weather observers is of great importance to planters, shipping men and residents in general, and it is hoped that the public will freely cooperate with the Government in the establishment
