TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Nov. 17th.—Operators in the soft coal industry today considered called upon the Department of Justice to enforce more vigorously the Federal court mandate against the striking miners, and to force resumption of Work

in those districts where the men walked out on November 1st. The Govt has not done its full duty in requiring the withdrawal of the strike orders, several operators declared, pointing out that a general stoppage of production of coal, exists in many mines employing union labour.

Winnipeg, Nov. 17th. "Sleeping sickness" was made a reportable and notifiable disease, and subject to the laws of quarantine, by a regulation passed by the provincial board of health on Saturday, it is announced that several deaths have occurred in Winnipeg and the province since a recent outbreak of this malady.

Washington, Nov. 17th.—President Wilson will pocket the peace treaty if it contains the lodge reservations, he told Senator Hitchcock at a conference today at the White House "the President has read and considered the Lodge reservations, Senator Hitchcock said, and he considers them a nullification of the treaty and utterly impossible."

Washington, Nov. 17th.—The Shantung reservation was adopted by the Senate on Saturday without change, by a vote of 41 without debate, the next reservation was agreed to, it reads "the United States understands that the reparation commission will regulate or interfere with exports from the United States to Germany, or from Germany to the United States, only when the United States by act or joint resolution of Congress approves such regulation of interference" the committee's economic boycott reservation went through with the usual majority. A committee reservation providing that rights of American citizens in the administration of enemy alien property shall not be foreclosed by the treaty, also was adopted with brief debate after adopting all but two of the committee's reservations to the peace treaty, the Senate adjourned until Monday. The remaining two reservations were unacted upon, but all thought the day the committee reservations had been accepted with substantial majorities.

London, Nov. 17th.—The injury to the eye which Mr. Johnson, the American anti-saloon organizer, received last week during the demonstration by students, in which he was the central figure, is proving more serious than at first thought. A second specialist has been consulted, and another operation has been performed. It is feared it may be necessary to extract the eye. The prohibition campaigner's eyesight has been permanently impaired, it is said, and

it is considered doubtful whether the second operation will save his sight.

London, Nov. 17th. A Moscow wireless message says the people's court has sentenced Mr. Keating, an English newspaper correspondent to prison "until the war with Imperialist England is ended" Mr. Keating was charged with crossing the frontier without Soviet permission and attempting to bribe the guards.

Fiume, Nov. 17th.—Gabriele D'Annunzio returned here Saturday from his expedition to Zara on the Dalmatian coast. His arrival was the occasion for an enthusiastic demonstration. D'Annunzio left the garrison at Zara, commanded by an officer of his own staff with several hundred of his troops. D'Annunzio received a most cordial welcome at Zara. It is announced that D'Annunzio will occupy all of Austria, which is being considered by the peace conference, including the sections foreign Minister Tironi proposed, shall comprise an independent state.

Washington, Nov. 17th.—The Blanket Reservation of the Foreign Relations Committee to preclude from the jurisdiction of the League of Nations all questions affecting honour or its vital interest of the United States, was defeated today in the Senate. The Reservation, the last on the Committee list, was rejected by the Committee vote of administration democrats and the old reservation republicans 56 to 36. On the eve of the final vote on the Peace Treaty, President Wilson gave the Senate to understand today that unless it modified the reservations already adopted, he would take the Treaty back to the White House, and lock it up in his desk. The first effect of the warning was to stricken the lines of both sides of the Senate fight. Then comprised proposals of many kinds were thrown out by the Democrats in a final effort to break into the majority programme. They found the Treaties Republican friends, all of whom had voted for the Reservations disposed to listen, but to promise nothing, and tonight the life of the Treaty seemed to hang on a slender thread. A decision one way or the other is planned for Wednesday, and under the closure rule the Leaders say it cannot be delayed beyond Thursday or Friday. Tomorrow the Senate will remain in session until it has cleared away all proposed reservations, leaving nothing to do but act upon the reservation resolution itself. Four

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
