asked Leonid Krassin, their representative in London, to elucidate certain parts of it, before finally deciding upon its acceptance. The passing of the crisis, together with the movement towards re-approachment with Japan, has had an extremely cheering effect here, officials express the hope that the negotiations with Japan will proceed satisfactorily, although Japan as yet, has been unwilling to evacuate North Sakhalin, is one of Russia's principal conditions for an agreement.

Troon, June 15th.—Arthur Gladstone Havers, a young English professional, who has played golf ever since he was old enough to hold a club, today won the British open golf championship of 1923 by a margin of one stroke over Walter Hagen, who came from the United States to defend the title he acquired a year ago at Sandwich. Through the sound and sturdy efforts of Havers, Great Britain has won back its own cup which has been held in the United States for two successive years. Playing every round of the 72 holes with remarkable steadiness, Havers amassed a grand total of only 295 strokes, five less than Hagen made to win the trophy last year. Hagen ended his 72 holes today with 296 strokes recorded on his card. Third place went to Mac Donald Smith, of San Francisco, who had a score of 297, including a 69 this morning that broke the record for the old Troon course. Joe Kirkwood, the Australian champion, came in fourth with 298 strokes, he also getting a sixty-nine during the day. Between 10,000 and 15,000 spectators watched the last two rounds of the competition. Two-thirds of them kept their eyes on Hagen in the last hour of his gallant struggle to overtake Havers, who was leading him by

two strokes when they went out after lunch for the last eighteen holes.

New York, June 15th.—Irish Americans, Free State and Irish Republican sympathizers of both the Protestant and Catholic Faith, organized last night the American fraternity of the Sons of Erin and pledged themselves to do all they could to wipe out the factionalism in the country. Unity for Ireland, whatever she may decide upon, and mind our own business here, was the keynote of the meeting sounded by Judge Cornelius F. Collins. We cannot attempt to unite Ireland or Irish sympathizers by anathema or abuse for those who have taken sides, Judge Collins continued. The hour has arrived to get together and unite the men and women of our blood, irrespective of party or religion, to take advantage of the grand opportunity offered to Ireland. Charter members of the new organization include state and city judges and prominent Irish Americans in various professional and business lines.

Fredericton, N. B., June 15th.—Lumbermen placed the momentary loss suffered so far in the destruction by forest fires, which have burned over 250 square miles in New Brunswick during the past two weeks, at not less than four million dollars. The figures were reached by a valuation basis of an average of 25 dollars to the acre on approximately 160,000 acres. In addition, there have been losses in destruction of mills, houses, barns and various other buildings, as well as several highway bridges and crops in some settlements.

Quebec, June 15th.—The villages of Esully and Les Etroits Temiscouta county, have been completely destroyed by forest fires and unconfirmed reports have

it that two lives were lost. Even the churches of those villages and some 75 houses, which were occupied by settlers and lumber jacks, are nothing but a mass of ruins and the fire is still extending. The Edmundston express which reached here last evening, carried on board a number of those who were able to make their escape. They reported that the fire had spread so rapidly that many of them had not been able to save their clothing.

Washington, June 15th.—The International Cotton Conference reached an agreement on Tuesday for the adoption of the United States official cotton standard as the basis for the world cotton trade. Signature of the agreement was withheld pending confirmation by cable from the various foreign cotton exchanges. The conference was called by the secretary at the request of the British Cotton Association, which desired to present views of the new cotton standards law before regulations for its enforcement finally were adopted. The new United States law provides that all sales and shipments of United States cotton in interstate and foreign commerce must be in accordance with the United States official cotton standards. Heretofore much of the United States cotton sold abroad has been on Liverpool standards.

London, June 18th.—Continuing their innings on Saturday at Newcastle the Northumberland XI scored 118 runs. Strangerleathes 15, McKay 9, Bruce 15, Ankle 2, Fairservice 21, Harbottle 1, Dyer 0, Lindesey 39, Milne 12, Craig 1, Hether-ton not out 3. Total 118. Bowling for the West Indians, Francis captured one wicket for 55 runs, Browne five wickets for 38 runs, Constantine three wickets for 8 runs, Pascall one wicket for 7

In a second turn at the wickets the Northumberland XI were bowled out for 159 runs. London, June 16th.—Maurice Hewlett, the novelist, died of pneumonia yesterday at his home, Broadchalke Salisbury.

Beckenham, June 16th.—Mrs Satterthwaite, British tennis star, easily defeated Mrs. Mallory in the semi-finals of the Kent tennis championship today. The score was 6-0, 6-2. The United States champion was completely outclassed.

Werden, June 16th.—Paul Kellerman, Director General of the Good Hope mines at Oberhausen, was sentenced by a French court martial yesterday to five years in prisonment and a heavy fine for refusing to make reparation coal deliveries to the French and failure to pay the coal tax of 40 percent.
