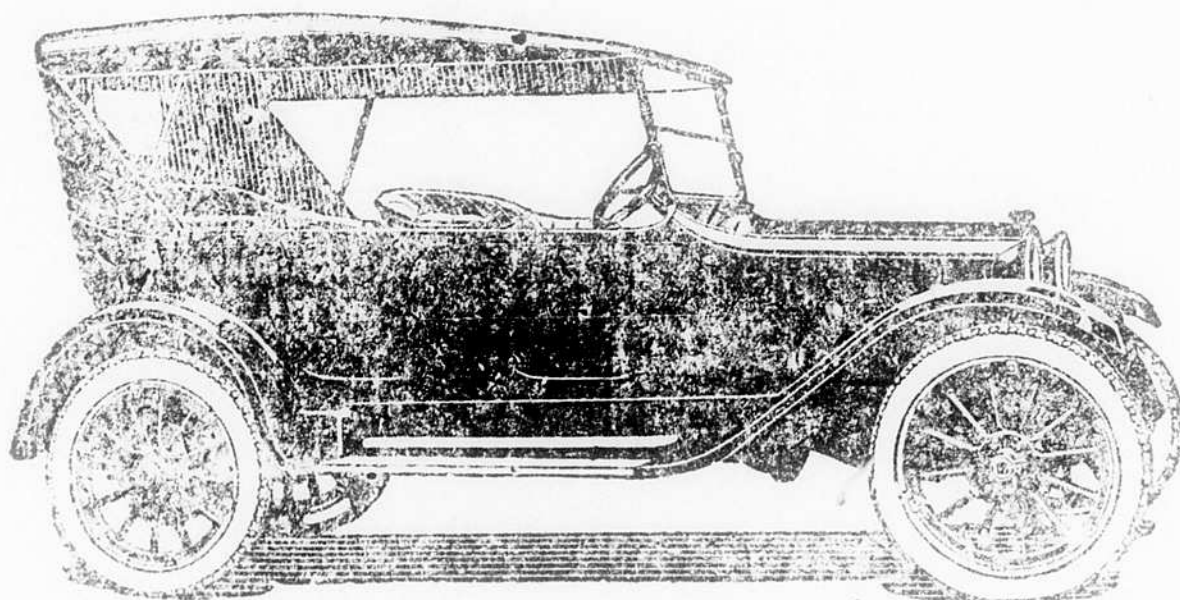

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, May 19th.—If the Supreme

Court's edict preventing transatlantic
crafts from carrying liquors within the
United States three mile limit stands, the
Cunard and Anchor Lines will adhere strict-
ly to the law, Sir Ashley Sparks, General
Agent for the United States, announced
today upon his return on the Aquitania
from a conference with officials of the
lines.

Moscow, May 19th.—A Russian Soviet
note sent by Foreign Minister Tchitcherin
to the Swiss Government holds that Gov-
ernment responsible for the recent as-
sassination at Lausanne of M. Vorosky,
Soviet representative there, through the
alleged negligence of the Swiss officials
to guard him. M. Tchitcherin's note
asks for an investigation of the circum-
stances of the crime, the dismissal of
the employees it charges with negligence
and a prompt and speedy trial of the
assassin. The note also protests at the
refusal of the Swiss to grant diplomatic
courier privileges to the Russian delega-
tion at Lausanne.

Lausanne, May 12th.—Greece last
night took a more defiant attitude under
the reparations dispute with Turkey, an
attitude which threatens a rupture of
the conference. The Greek delegation
issued an official declaration insisting on
reciprocal renunciation by Greece and
Turkey of all reparations claims. M.
Venezelos' head of the Greek delegation,
is regarded by the delegates to the con-
ference as having thus played a card
which is calculated to embarrass the
Allies by forcing them to support the
Greek stand, as the Allies had originally
included in the peace treaty this mutual
renunciation. M. Venezelos referred to
this clause presented to the Turks by
the Allies at the last conference and
amended at the last minute when the
conference collapsed. It provided for
direct settlement between Greece and
Turkey and arbitration, if an agreement
was not reached. Neither Greece nor
Turkey accepted this amendment, Tur-
key refusing to recognize any Greek
claims for damages, but, being willing
to submit their claims against the Greeks
to arbitration. M. Venezelos now flatly
demands that the Allies restore the ori-
ginal clause of the treaty. The Near
East conference today formally recog-
nized the abolition of the official sanita-
tion board, which has long supervised
health conditions in Turkey. Turkey
has agreed to appoint three foreign phy-
sicians as an advisory board, particularly
in preparing effective sanitary regula-
tions for the Turkish Straits, to prevent
epidemics from spreading to Europe.

London, May 19th.—Two young for-
eigners, charged with being stowaways,
were charged by a Scotland Yard detec-
tive here yesterday as "dangerous revo-
lutionaries". They were, he said, cour-
iers and a link in a revolutionary chain
that is working between Great Britain
