TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, Oct. 25th. —In the course of a long address before the National Assembly, which consisted mainly of a protest against recent addresses by Premier Clemenceau, and which was called the "Militaristic Tenacity" of France toward Germany, as well as the inconsistent spirit shown in the formation of the League of Nations. Foreign Minister Mueller insisted today upon the necessity for German evacuation of Lithuania and Latvia, he said this step was necessary to convince the world of Germany's desire for peace. The German Government disapproves of the telegram sent by General Von der Goltz recently, congratulating Colonel Avaloff-Bermond on his success in the fighting near Riga, he declared, "and I hope this will be the last case of a Prussian General meddling in politics", we are not friends of the Bolshevik. Foreign Minister, Muller, said in advocating good relations with all border States. "But we protest in the sharpest manner against the blockade of Soviet Russia proposed to us by the Entente, because it is not the leaders who suffer by such a step, but the masses of the Russian people, who will suffer the greatest misery. The unemployment and hunger which such a blockade would foster are just the things to promote Bolshevism.

Madrid, Oct. 25th. —The Queen left today for England. She will go by the way of Paris, stopping at San Sebastian for a few days' visit to the Queen Dowager.

Paris, Oct. 25th. —The military measures decided upon between the Supreme Council and Marshal Foch to carry out provisions of the peace treaty coincident

with the coming into force of that instrument, will be carried out between November 5th. and November 10th. according to "La Liberte", the same paper states that the retirement of General Mangin as near of the inter-allied mission to the Baltic, if it becomes effective, is due to Genl. Mangin's desire, the General having manifested preferences which the Govt. took into consideration. General Franche Desperay, formerly commander of the Allied forces in the near east may succeed Genl. Mangin, according to reports in several papers.

London, Oct. 26th. —Viscountess Astor has consented to be the coalition candidate for the division of Plymouth, represented by her husband until his succession to the Peerage. Everyone agrees that she has a great chance of being the first woman to sit in the House of Commons.

Berlin, Oct. 26th. —The Foreign Affairs Committee of the Assembly has concurred to the decision to decline participation in the blockade against Russia. All the party committees have taken the same standpoint unanimously. The German answer to the Entente will declare that Germany refuses any intercourse with Soviet Russia, but is forced to refuse energetically to take part in such terrible injustice against any people.

Washington, Oct. 26th. —President Wilson has decided to call a new conference to continue the efforts to establish industrial peace. It will consist of fifteen of the most prominent Americans without division into groups, and the cabinet will recommend nominations to the President.

Dominica, Oct. 28th. —His Honour A. W. Mahaffy, O.B.E., Administrator of this presidency died here yesterday after a short illness; pending the appointment of Mr. Mahaffy's successor, the Govt. of the presidency will be administered by the Hon. Dr. H. A. Alford Nicolls, C. M. G.

Kingston, Ont., Oct. 26th. —The Prince of Wales a fortnight hence will begin a visit to the United States and will return formally, on behalf of the King, the visit which President Wilson paid to Windsor. The President's illness delayed somewhat the completion of arrangements for the entertainment of the Prince in America. Details will shortly be forthcoming from Washington as to what functions will follow the arrival of the Prince and his suite at Washington on the morning of November 11th, which will be a national holiday in America.

The Prince's stay in Washington will probably be of about three days' duration and from there will go to New York to embark on H. M. S. Renown, remaining in New York for a few days and living on his ship while there. The Renown will put into Halifax enroute to England to enable the Prince to say goodbye to Canada.

The Hague, Oct. 26th. —The entire Dutch Press joins in scathing criticism of an article advocating the surrender of the former German Emperor for trial which appears in the weekly Journal "New Amsterdam" in the article, the editor Prof. J. A. Hamil, the Dutch publicist who was selected by Sir James Eric Drummond, Secretary General of the League of Nations, as head of the legal Dept. of the League, argues that the question of the extradition of the former Emperor should not be treated as a purely legal matter. It should instead be regarded from the point of view of the new jurisprudence belonging to the new era and formal judicial obstacles should not be permitted to stand in the way of the extradition of Wilhelm of Hohenzollerns.

New York, Oct. 25th. —"Scotland is going dry next year", according to the Rev. Dr. Jowitt, who sailed on the Adriatic for England today after preaching a month in his pulpit at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. "It will surprise many", he said. "That I make the assertion that Scotland next year will vote to go dry for I do not believe it is realized here how far the temperance movement has progressed in the British Isles a country which has prohibition will become 80% more efficient than one which has not, and drink-ridden countries across the sea will have to follow in the footsteps of the U. S., or fall behind in the economic race.

London, Oct. 25th. —Heavy fighting is going on along General Denekine's entire front. The fighting extends 700 miles from Bartizy on to Kiev. The Chief of the British Military Mission with General Denekine reports under yesterday's date that the battle so far is going successfully for the anti-Bolshevik forces.
