TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 16th. The refusal by the United States to participate in the proposed continuance of the Genoa Conference at the Hague will cause great disappointment in many quarters here, where it is strongly hoped that the Allies invitation would be accepted. News of the declination came too late for yesterday's morning newspapers, which feature despatches from the correspondents at Genoa encouraging the expectations of a favourably reply. The "Times" and the "Daily Mail", both of which have been so antagonistic to the Genoa Conference,

editorially declared that the success of the proposed meeting at the Hague was practically dependent upon participation by the United States. One doubt is still expressed as to whether the proposed meeting will take place at all, but in any case there is apparently no finality about the choice of The Hague as the place of meeting, and this was emphasized by the Dutch Minister for Foreign Affairs when he returned to The Hague from Genoa on Sunday night. Meanwhile the public here is watching the final scenes of the Genoa Conference and an adjournment is expected by the end of the present week. The World says the "Times", will utter a sigh of deep and heartfelt relief when it learns that the delegations have left without working mischiefs greater than those as yet known. Mr. Lloyd George is expected to arrive here from Genoa on Friday. He is described in some despatches as weary, depressed and sad and in need of some days rest before he can give the House of Commons the anticipated account of his stewardship.

Genoa, May 16th.---Mr. Lloyd George does not feel it was indicated that the American refusal to participate in the Commission to sit at the Hague is her final word as the document indicates great American interest in Russia as economic reconstruction and the reply is regarded as forming the basis for further correspondence.

Paris, May 16th.---The Budget for 1923 which has been submitted to Parliament, provides 23,180,000,000 francs for expenditures, although the receipts amount to only 19,285,000,000 francs. The deficit it is stated, will be raised through loans.

Manilla, May 16th.---The cruiser "Renown", with the Prince of Wales on board, sailed today for England. He is still wearing a bandage over the right eye, blackened by the impact with a Polo ball a few days ago.

Genoa, May 16th.---The Allied Powers will probably make a new appeal to the United States, in an endeavour to persuade that country to take part in the meeting of the Commission of experts at the Hague on June fifteenth. The Powers, who sent the invitation, England, France, Italy, Belgium and Japan, held a meeting this afternoon to examine the question afresh. The French delegates wished the Conference to close on Thursday, but this was thought impossible in order to press the Russians for a definite reply regarding the Hague Conference and it is thought the final sitting will not take place before Saturday or Monday next. Tomorrow morning the Russians will meet the Sub-Commission on political affairs to discuss the Hague programme. At the meeting today M. Tchitcherin asked certain number of questions concerning details of the proposed conference and at his request the Russians obtained twenty-four hours in which to reply to the proposals made yesterday relative to the said Confer-
