TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, May 4th.—Mr. Weeks, Secretary of War, has announced that the return to the United States of two battalions now at Coblenz will be delayed.

Paris, May 4th.—The Ministry of Foreign Affairs has issued a categorical denial of the reported retirement of M. Jusserand, Ambassador at Washington, declaring it to be without foundation.

London, May 4th.—The "Herald" today stated that in an interview with M. Tchitcherin on the Russian memorandum by its Genoa Correspondent, the Russian declared that "every day it is more evident that this conflict is one between the capitalist and our conceptions of society. We believe it possible that both can co-exist, but the Capitalist nations in Europe demand from us that we surrender that

which makes co existence impossible. The issue is, are we to abandon our rights and the conquests of revolution? Our only answer is, that we are not". He added that the demand of the Allies that the Russians suppress revolutionary propaganda implies the suppression of the communist party, which naturally we never would consider.

London, May 4th.—The "Sketch" says it learns from reliable French sources that France is preparing for the immediate mobilization of the 1918 class of reserves, numbering about 150,000 men, in view of enforcing the reparations after May thirty first, if this should be found necessary.

Dublin, May 5th.—A truce between the rival Irish Republican forces was announced yesterday afternoon, to be operative from four o' clock in the afternoon, until four p. m. on Monday, with a view to giving both sections of the army an immediate opportunity to discuss a basis for army unification.

Houston Texas, May 5th.—A tornado of terrific proportions struck Austin late yesterday, moving South East. It is reported that the waters of the Colorado river, swollen by heavy rains, were hurled into the air. As the typhoon-like winds moved Southwards, telegraph and tele-

phone connections became badly crippled.

Paris, May 5th.—M. Barthou left this morning for Genoa, after an interview with M. Poincare and the members of the Cabinet on the situation. Just before his departure he had a final interview with the Premier, who strongly urged him to endeavour to reach an agreement with the Allies on the Russian memorandum which would satisfy Belgium and not sacrifice the principle that private property of foreigners in Russia should be respected. The French Govt., it is learned this morning through a high official at the ministry of Foreign Affairs, has not entered into any negotiations whatever relative to recognition of the Soviet Govt. and is entirely free to deal with the question from the French point of view, which is, that the Moscow Govt. cannot yet be considered a representative one and that there is no reason to give it the moral support which would result from official recognition. Belgium continues to insist strongly on the insertion of a new clause relative to the treatment of private property and it is said that M. Barthou will submit this new clause to replace that actually contained in the memorandum. Even if the committee on Russian affairs consents to approve of the clause, it will be difficult to persuade the Russians to accept it, as they already complain bitterly of the present clause, while the French and Belgians insist on conditions much more severe, demanding guarantees that Russia will not transfer foreign property to new owners.

Ahmednagar India, May 5th.—Hasrat Monsri, President of the all India Moslem league, has been sentenced to two years imprisonment on a charge of sedition, after the judge had refused to accept a unanimous verdict of not guilty rendered by the jury, which included five Indians. The second charge of inciting to war referred to a higher court.

Peking, May 5th.—General Wupeifu was in control at Peking at noon today and General Changtsolen, whose forces he ousted yesterday in a fierce battle South of the capital, is reported to be fleeing to Mukden and his army retreating in disorder towards Tienkin. Observers here believe that General Chang's sudden collapse has ended the hostilities.

London, May 5th.—Lord Northcliffe, in resigning from the London newspaper proprietors association, declares that the association was of great value during the war in fighting the press bureau and newspaper control, but that the situation was quite different.

Washington, May 5th.—The Miller bill, designed to shut the gates against the import and export of all narcotics, except crude opium and cocoa leaves, and providing for the creation of a federal narcotics control board to administer the law as tightened up, was passed unanimously by the House of Representatives yesterday and has been sent to the Senate.
