TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 9th.—The Foreign Office here has heard that General Wrangel declared to the French High Commissioner that his army returned to the Crimea three times more numerous than when it entered the Taurida five months ago.

Constantinople, Nov. 9th.—The Nationalists are holding Colonel Combs, Director of the American Commission for relief in the near East at Samsun, and will not permit him to proceed into the interior on a tour of inspection or return to Constantinople. It is reported that he and other United States citizens are held as hostages at the instance of the Bolshevik at Angora.

London, Nov. 9th.—Germany has delivered to the reparation commission bonds to the amount of 60,000,000,000 gold marks. This announcement was made in the House of Commons today by Mr. Austen Chamberlain. The delivery of the bonds is in accordance with the requirements of the Peace Treaty and the Commission proposes to hold them as security for and an acknowledgement of Germany's debt.

London, Nov. 9th.—The Historic Procession of the newly elected Lord Mayor of London, participated in by the dignitaries of the Municipal Corporation wended its way through the streets of the Metropolis today, following the formal introduction of Alderman James Roll into the office yesterday.

London, Nov. 9th.—Captain Emmet Kilpatrick, representative of the American Red Cross in South Russia and two nurses were brutally killed during a Bolshevik cavalry raid on Salkovo Station, says a Sebastopol despatch to Reuter's Limited tonight.

Paris, Nov 9th.—Marshal Foch has become the centre of an animated discussion which is occupying the attention of the French Press and political circles generally to the exclusion of almost all other subjects. The main point turns on the relations of Marshal Foch and Premier Clemenceau in the crucial stages of the war and the circumstances leading to the marshal's elevation to the rank of Commander of the Allied forces. Marshal Foch has given his own version declaring that he had only been appointed to the supreme command after Premier Clemenceau had yielded to the insistence of others including Field Marshal Haig and asserting that his relations with M.
