The polling will commence at 1 o'clock p. m. in accordance with article 30 of the Colonial law will close at 4 o'clock p. m. at the earliest.

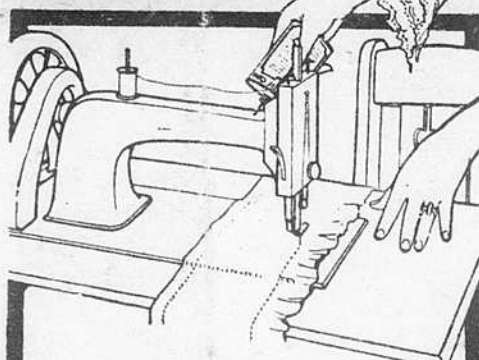

The written announcement signed by the announcer (announcers) must be sent to the undersigned Chairman at my official office not later than 4 o'clock p. m. on July 26, and for receiving announcement made personally, the Electoral Board will meet at the place where the election is to be held at 3 o'clock p. m. on Wednesday July 27.

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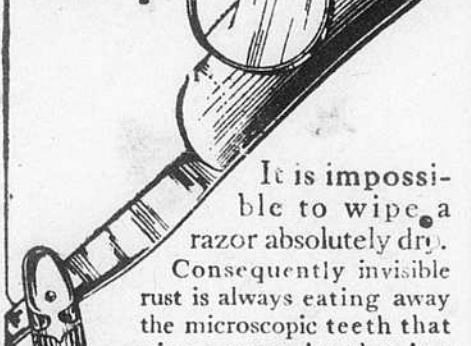

Office-Request Envelopes

STAMPED envelopes with blank return-cards, known as "office-request" envelopes, are again on sale at this office. The return-card includes blank lines on which the user's name and local address or post office box may be written with pen, and names of post office and State, for example:

CHRISTIANSTED, St. Croix, V. I., U. S.

It is desired to encourage the use of "office-request" stamped envelopes by patrons as it is of much mutual benefit to the public and the postal service. When purchasers of these envelopes

complete the card by writing their names and local addresses on the blank lines, it provides prompt return of undeliverable letters to senders, lessens the work of the Division of Dead Letters, and tends to encourage the use of return-cards on other mail.

Plain stamped envelopes are also kept on sale for purchasers who prefer to print their own return cards in special styles; also newspaper wrappers of the 1c. denomination.

It is brought to attention that the envelopes are all of standard quality, and are sold in any number, from a single envelope to a thousand at the thousand rate. The price of the envelope is but a fraction above the face value of the stamp embossed on it.
