TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Constantinople, Nov. 7th.—The British have at no time since the intentions of Turkish Nationalists were made evident, relaxed in the least their vigilance, and French warships are about to proceed here or there on their way to strengthen the Allied authority. Lieutenant-General Sir Charles Harrington, has informed Rafet Pasha, the new Governor, that he would permit no usurpation of the Allied authority, and Rafet explained that the sweeping demands for evacuation of the Allied military forces and for other concessions, came from the Angora Gov. The Kemalists have even attempted to take over the customs themselves. The calling of three additional classes to the Turkish colours is interpreted here as merely a show of force.

Constantinople, Nov. 8th.—Continued insistence by the Nationalist authorities on the abolition of inter-allied control of the police, customs, railways, and the censorship over Turkish newspapers, has caused a recrudescence in the crisis and it is believed here that it will be necessary for the Allies to proclaim martial law. The Eastern Telegraph Cable has been cut on the Kemalist side of the Chanak Zone in Asia Minor, and the Turks refuse to permit the company to repair the line. The revolutionary committee in Greece has published a decree ordering that the Courtmartial of the former Cabinet Ministers and Generals now under arrest, charged with responsibility for the Greek disaster in Asia Minor. The decree exempts ex-King Constantine from trial.

Washington, Nov. 8th.—The cruiser Pittsburg, flagship of Vice Admiral Long in Command of the United States naval forces in European waters, has left Gibraltar for Constantinople for eventualities.

New York, Nov. 8th.—Latest returns this afternoon indicate that the Democrats have won control of the State Senate by one vote, confirming earlier returns. Several upsets at one time led to the belief that the Republican had retained control. Revision of returns showed the following composition of the new legislature: House of Assembly, 82 Republicans, 68 Democrats. Senate, 25 Republicans, 26 Democrats. Total 107 Republicans 94 Democrats.

New York, Nov. 8th.—There was no change in the local raw sugar market today, with Cubas quoted at 3 1/2 cents cost and freight, equal to 5.53 for centrifugal. No sales were reported. Raw sugar futures were easy early under scattered liquidation, causing declines of 1 to 2 points on active positions, but prices rallied in the afternoon, on covering and buying, believed to be for Cuban account. There were no changes in refined sugars, with fine granulated listed at 6.90 to 7.00.
