LOCAL.

A large mail arrived here on Saturday by the Virginia.

The S. S. Lake Ledan called at Frederiksted on Saturday and at this port in the afternoon, sailing again for Windward at about noon yesterday.

A slight shock of earthquake of short duration was felt here shortly before noon on Saturday.

In consequence of an order whereby the sale of fish in Water Gut quarter was discontinued some days ago, the fishermen and residents of that part of the town have filed an appeal with the Government that the order which is alleged to incur great inconvenience to a large section of the community may be revoked; and if possible better means conforming with requirements provided for the continued sale of fish in Water Gut where a number of fishermen reside and keep their boats. It is hoped that the petition will be given consideration.

The arrival of the s. s. Parima which had been fixed for yesterday evening was changed late Saturday to Sunday daybreak with the result that, due to the short notice, some passengers and the mail were left behind. The mail was, of course forwarded via Porto Rico.

Something was wrong with the electric-current supply last night and the town was in darkness on that account. The Navy Band had to abandon its intention to play as no light was available in the bandstand.

TELEGRAMS.**ST. CROIX STATION.**

London, Sept. 29th.—The West India Committee announces that the steamship "Intab" of the Harrison Line will leave London on November 29th for the West Indies. The vessel, it is stated, has accommodation for eighty passengers.

Riga, Sept. 29th.—The Lithuanians have arranged for another conference at Suwalki today, when they hope to adjust conditions and halt the Polish advance to the east, which is threatening to disrupt the Riga conference.

Riga, Sept. 29th.—The terms suggested by the Soviet peace delegates include a proposal that the hostilities cease within 48 hours after the preliminary treaty of peace is signed and the Polish troops withdrawn approximately 15 miles westward of the demarcation line. They undertake to agree that the Russians will withdraw the same distance maintaining the rate of 12 miles in the first 24 hours. This strip of territory would be a neutral zone during the final peace arrangements, both Poland and Russia agreeing that they would not tolerate in the zone the formation or maintenance of organizations opposed to the present Govts. of either country.

London, Sept. 29th.—Sir Horace Plunkett has reentered the Irish controversy with an appeal to the Sinn Feiners to abandon the republican idea and accept his policy as the only solution of the Irish problem.

London, Sept. 27th.—A wireless despatch from Moscow today says that Poland has received large supplies from the Allies through Danzig. England the message declared, sent seven steamers loaded with ammunitions and three tanks and twelve small vessels with provisions, while the United States sent six ships with volunteers. From France two ships arrived with more than 1,000 men and fifteen tanks.

Sebastopol, Sept. 29th.—General Wrangel has made prisoners of nearly 20,000 Bolsheviks north of Alexandrovsk. With the aid of the Ukrainian General Makno it is reported that General Wrangel controls the famous Donetsk Coal Basin.

London, Sept. 29th.—Viscount Grey in
