strike fund, were seized today by the forces of occupation. Half of this amount was confiscated in the Muelheim branch of the Reichbank and the other eight billion marks while in shipment through Mayence.

Berlin, June 26th.—Captain Hans Rose, commander of the German submarine U-3 which surprised the world in October 1916 by suddenly appearing off Newport R. I., has been arrested by the Belgians and imprisoned at Verkrade, according to Red Cross advices from the Ruhr, which assert that he is lying at the point of death because of maltreatment by the soldiers.

New York, June 26th.—Sir Auckland Geddes sailed for home today on the Berengaria for a three months rest. The Ambassador's sight, which has been seriously affected during the past few months was said to be improving slowly. His friends say he will not become entirely blind, as was first feared.

London, June 26th.—Lord Astor, speaking before a charity organization on the subject of prohibition, said ever since the United States had inaugurated its great experiment the British liquor trade had been carrying on deliberate propaganda against the United States. He objected to the deliberate attempts to misrepresent everything associated with the United States. It was a tragic thing that while anti-British propaganda in the United States had ceased, people were working in Great Britain to misrepresent the attitude and actions of the United States. Lord Astor charged that the liquor trade in Great Britain had a powerful political organization which was determined to turn Lady Astor out of public life.

Calcutta, June 26th.—Thirty-nine Mohammedan boy orphans were killed today the collapse of a section of the orphan-building in the heart of Calcutta. Twenty five were sent to the hospital and twenty five were slightly

injured. Two hundred and twenty-nine inmates, from three to eighteen years of age, were asleep in the dormitories when the building, which recently had a second story superimposed, collapsed, burying about a hundred of the children in the debris. The others escaped.

Ottawa, June 26th.—Amendments of the business profits war tax and the income tax act are to be introduced in the House by Mr. Fielding. The amendments deal largely with questions of administration. Regarding the income tax one amendment stipulates that the income of a taxpayer shall be deemed to be no less than the income of his chief occupation. Another that provisions be made respecting exemption of the income of Consuls and officials of a foreign country, or of Great Britain, or any of its self-governing colonies and of the pensions of any members of the military, naval, or air forces of His Majesty's Allies.

London, June 26th.—The House of Lords, by a vote of 95 to 8, today passed the second reading of the bill making the ground for divorce the same for both sexes. The measure now stands a good chance for becoming law. It was passed by the House of Commons early this month.

Berlin, June 26th.—"No Government can cancel the passive resistance policy born in the hearts of men and women of the Rhineland and the Ruhr", Chancellor Cuno declared at Koenigsberg. He stated that Premier Poincare is still unwilling to negotiate and he urged a firm front in Germany against "the enemy's maliciousness." We are not only ready to promise to pay, but we are also ready to pay. We have got the world thinking of our case." His speech voiced the German belief that the latest offer is a sincere endeavour to pay as much as Germany immediately is able on reparations and to lay a firm foundation for the full payment of thirty billion gold

marks. Meanwhile the rising food prices and the delay and anxiety over reparations are causing sporadic outbursts throughout Germany. Fascisti are active in Munich. A group of them have attacked the Socialists, slightly wounding four. Communists and Fascists groups clashed at Halle with a number of minor casualties. There is an increasing demand for an end to the passive resistance policy and for use of force.

London, June 26th.—The text for the proposal from the United States Secretary of State to extend to 12 miles the limit within which searches for liquor might be carried out and otherwise modifying the liquor enforcement laws affecting steamers, has been received by the Foreign Office. The department experts are engaged in studying the document, as well as the full text of the United States Supreme Court's decision in the ship liquor case and it will take probably several weeks before Great Britain makes reply to the communication. While the Government, it is declared, regards Mr. Hughes' suggestion as difficult if not impossible of fulfilment, the Foreign Office is desirous of accommodating the United States views so far as is consistent with existing maritime law and British policy.

London, June 27th.—A new and violent eruption broke out this morning near the summit, on the south side of Mount Etna, plainly visible to the naked eye in Catania, says a Rome despatch to the Central News. It is feared that the observatory has been overwhelmed. Professor Carrara reports the new flow of lava is progressing at the rate of a kilometre an hour.

London, June 27th.—Mr. Bonar Law has sufficiently improved in health to be able to leave London for a resort on the south coast. It is authoritatively stated that there has been a slight but distinctly favourable result from the treatment the Premier recently underwent.

Washington, June 27th.—Survey of an air route around the world has been authorized by the Secretary of the Army, preliminary to a decision as to whether an attempt will be made by the army air service to circumnavigate the globe.

Washington, June 27th.—A new regulation, prohibiting the bringing of liquor into United States waters after a certain advance date next month under penalty of seizure of the liquor carrying ship and arrest of its Captain, is understood to have been virtually agreed upon today as a result of conferences among officials here. Foreign Governments are to be notified again of this government's intention to force the Supreme Court's liquor orders vigorously, it is understood and to warn that the seizure of offending ships will result from further violations. The plan is to give due notice of the decision so that foreign ship lines can make the necessary changes before the seizure policy becomes effective.
