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TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 16th.—Lord Grey of Fallodon, recently appointed Ambassador to the United States, was the guest of honour today at a private luncheon given by the American Luncheon Club. The luncheon was attended by a very large number of the members of the club.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 16th.—A seismograph of the St. Louis university showed a rather violent earth disturbance lasting for 24 minutes from 12 36 p. m. yesterday. The instrument indicated that the disturbances were 1800 miles due south and the announcement given out stated it was probably in or around Guatemala.

Paris, Sept. 16th.—Serbia, one of the two nations which did not sign the Austrian Peace Treaty, Rumania being the other, will attach a belated signature to that document, according to the "Echo de Paris" today. It has information, it says that such a step on the part of Serbia's delegates is certain, and that action to his end is to be the first taken by the new Serbian ministry when its formation is completed.

Paris, Sept. 16th.—The Supreme Council has agreed to send a note to Germany saying the peace conference disregards the German representations that General Von der Goltz and the German troops in the Baltic States are not under German control, and holding Germany responsible for the speedy withdrawal of those forces. Marshal Foch attended the council today as adviser on the Baltic situation.

Paris, Sept. 16th.—Premiers Lloyd George and Clemenceau had a satisfactory conference yesterday on the

subject of Syria. A temporary arrangement was reached for the regulation of the situation and was approved by the Supreme Council. It will remain until the United States is ready to deal with the whole question of the future status of Turkey.

Berlin, Sept. 16th.—German representatives have withdrawn from the International Coal Commission, because the principles fixed by the commission for the drafting of regulations regarding the distributing of fuel are irreconcilable with the agreements concluded at Versailles, according to a statement issued here.

London, Sept. 16th.—Field Marshal Allenby commander of the Allied forces in Asia Minor, who headed the victorious expedition in Palestine, arrived in London this afternoon. He was accorded a most enthusiastic welcome.

Calgary, Sept. 16th.—For the first time His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales yesterday spoke straight to Canadians of their national duties and national problems. At the civic luncheon he spoke of his enjoyment of the atmosphere of the prairies, and his appreciation of the magnificent spirit of the western Canada people, from the earliest pioneers to the present. He urged the assimilation of all human material, and asserted that nothing could set Canada back except failure of different classes and communities to look to the wider interests of the Dominion, as well as their own immediate needs. Calgary's welcome to the Prince of Wales at the official opening of his visit to this city yesterday morning was only the warmer, for the fact that H. R. Highness had been in town 24 hours before the Mayor formally read the city's address of welcome in the presence of 35,000 citizens in Victoria Park. The Prince and a few members of his staff left Calgary after the civic luncheon for George Lane's Ranch near High River, where he will spend 36 hours on a quiet private visit, during which he will see a round-up of cattle and other incidents of ranch life. He will return to Calgary on Tuesday evening for a military ball, leaving immediately afterwards for Banff.

London, Sept. 16th.—An "authorized" denial of statements made by William C. Bullitt, formerly attached to the American Peace Delegation, before the Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate, which was printed in the London newspapers this morning, is attracting more notice here than Mr.

Bullitt's evidence before the Committee. "Somebody is lying, who is it?" summarized the widely expressed comment, and the opinion is general that explanations are imperatively needed. The London morning paper expressed in their editorials views which are coloured by their political predilections, some criticizing what they regard as Mr. Bullitt's "breach of confidence". The "Chronicle", a strong champion of Mr. Lloyd-George, says Mr. Bullitt's evidence was directed against President Wilson, Mr. Lansing and Colonel House. The "Morning Post" expresses the opinion that if Mr. Lansing endorses Mr. Bullitt's statements regarding the Secretary's views of the League of Nations treaty, "it will be all over, with the treaty, as far as the United States is concerned".

Watertown, Sept. 16th.—Mr. Lansing this afternoon was shown a copy of the report of the Bullitt testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, as well as newspaper comments. He reiterated he had absolutely no comment to make.

Paris, Sept. 16th. Marshal Foch will be appointed Vice-President of the French Superior War Council upon its establishment, according to the "Intransigeant". Marshal Petain and General Louis Frenchet Desperrey will be members of the Council, which will comprise eleven members.

Paris, Sept. 16th.—The commission of the high court sitting as a tribunal of accusation, has ordered Joseph Caillaux to face the charges of intriguing to bring about a premature and dishonourable peace with Germany. This Justice discharged Louis Louttalot and Paul Comby, who were held in connection with Caillaux case.

Washington, Sept. 16th.—The State Department has been officially advised that China has issued a mandate declaring herself now at peace with Germany.

St. Thomas, Sept. 16th.—Communication with Demerara restored but traffic still subject to delay.

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
