"HIS WIFE'S MONEY".

Appropriate theme is that of "His Wife's Money" at a time when domestic relations are being more strained than ever on economic questions. It also shows up the all-too-common selfishness of married women well off in their own right. There are male creatures who do not hesitate to sacrifice personal honor and dignity of character in order to live on wealthy wives, but they are not objects of admiration, even when they are socially tolerated. The genuine man, as impersonated by Eugene O'Brien, cannot disregard his protective instincts and happily subsist on "His Wife's Money." It is deep in his nature to go to the front where the fighting is hardest and do his share in the general struggle, hence he revolts at being a camp follower in his own family.

Such is the essence of the Selznick story. Its mood is fully appreciated by Eugene O'Brien and Zeena Keefe as the wife. Their performances are the more creditable in that they are of difficult characterization. Their highly intelligent interpretations of the leading roles and the vitality of the theme make "His Wife's Money" a satisfactory product and a good entertainment.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Speedway Ind., May 30th.—Tommy Milton of St. Paul Minn., today won the 500 mile automobile race at the Indianapolis motor speedway, repeating his victory of 1921. The race was decided before a record-breaking crowd of 150,000 the greatest throng that ever witnessed a sporting event in this country. Harry Harts of Los Angeles, second in the 1922 race, was second again today, five minutes behind the winner. Of the 24 cars that started only 10 withstood the gruelling test of speed and endurance to the finish. Two German cars sur-

vived the race along with eight United States creations. Milton's time for the 500 miles was announced as 5.28.06.27, an average of 91.44 miles an hour. It was the first time in the history of the race that a former winner repeated his triumph. Milton will receive about 35,000 dollars as a reward for his victory. Jimmy Murphy, the 1922 winner, finished third, about seventeen miles behind Milton.

Helsingfors, Finland, May 31st.—The Petrograd Opera House was burned last night and many were killed during a panic-stricken rush for the exits, according to a Central News despatch received here.

Washington May 31st.—The President yesterday uttered a prayer that the United States "do its full part toward making war unlikely, if not impossible." "We have already proven that we can have less armament", the President declared. "Let us strive for the assurance that we shall have none of war". He spoke at the annual memorial day exercises in Arlington. He coupled with

his prayers the hope that should war again come to the United States "we will not alone call to service the youth of the land, but will draft from every resource, every activity, all of wealth and make common cause of the nation's preservation".

London, May 31st.—A Rome despatch to the "Times" describes an attack on Deputy Misuri, a former Fascisti, who yesterday in the Chamber of Deputies made an eloquent appeal to Premier Mussolini to return to normal constitutional methods. While Misuri was walking late last night in a dark and narrow street, he suddenly received a blow on the back of the head, rendering him almost unconscious. He was then attacked by several assailants and so severely wounded as to necessitate his removal to hospital, where his condition is serious. A young officer of the Fascisti militia was arrested on the charge of taking part in the attack. He informed the police that he and others challenged Misuri to make an explanation of his speech in the Chamber. Misuri, however, denies this, declaring that he was attacked from behind without warning. At the opening of the Chamber today the President strongly deplored such violence, while Deputy Acerbo, on behalf of the Government, said that energetic steps would be taken to bring the offenders to justice.

Cape Town, May 31st.—By the death of Mr. Fichardt, Nationalist member of the Legislative Assembly for Ladybrand, Orange Free State, the Nationalist leader, General Hertzog, loses his principal lieutenant. Mr. Fichardt was a more aggressive person in politics than General Hertzog himself and was at various times responsible for heated debates in the South African Parliament, as well as bitter controversies with the press.

New York, May 31st.—The raw sugar market was easier early today and prices were 1/8c. lower, with Cuba's quoted at 6 1/2 cents, cost and freight, equal to 8 1/2 for centrifugal. There were sales of 10,000 bags of Cuba's. The easier ruling on the spot market and the continued moderate inquiry for refined led to renewed liquidation in raw sugar futures at one time during the forenoon showed declines of 14 to 18 points toward midday, however, a steadier feeling prevailed and values rallied on covering. At noon quotations were seven to ten points net lower. The market for refined was unsettled, while list prices were unchanged to 9.75 to 9.90 for fine granulated. It was reported that one refiner was accepting business at 9.50. Withdrawals on old contracts were of fair proportions, but new business was light.

New York, May 31st.—German marks have dropped nearly 3 1/2 points since Tuesday, being quoted in the local foreign exchange market today at 0014 1/2 cents, or 70.175 to the dollar, a new low record for all time.
