ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, April 25th.—Australia has uncovered a new tennis find, it is R. F. Schlesinger who has been tentatively selected as a member of this years Davis Cup Team, according to information received from the Antipodes. Schlesinger created a sensation recently by defeating Gerald Patterson, Captain of last years Australian International Team, in a four set match in the semi-finals of the Melbourne Country Club championship.

London, April 26th.—Amid scenes of extraordinary brilliance and naval, military and religious pageantry, another British Royal lovelorn match was consummated today, when the Duke of York led to the altar Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, daughter of the Earl and Countess of Strathmore and Kinghorne, member of one of the most famous and ancient of Scotlands feudal families. The Prince of Wales acted as best man. From an early hour vast crowds thronged the streets and the neighbourhood of the Abbey. Practically the whole of the British Royal family, including Viscount Lascelles, with many foreign Royalties and members of the British noble family were present. Mr. Bonar Law and the whole of the Cabinet were also there, together with representative delegations from the Houses of Lords and Commons, including Mr. Asquith, Mr. Lloyd George, the Earl of Birkenhead, Viscount Grey and Labour leaders, all with their wives. Emerging into the street, the Duke of York and his bride were greeted by a peal of the Abbey chimes. This was the signal for a deafening shout of acclaim from fifty thousand throats, as the multitude outside the Abbey craning their necks and standing on tip toe to catch a glimpse of the couple saw them step into their carriage for the drive to Buckingham Palace.

London, April 26th.—It is authoritatively announced that the King last night conferred upon Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, who today became the bride of the King's second son, the Duke of York, the dignity of Princess.

Essen, April 25th.—A mob of unemployed men clashed with the police yesterday at Katersberg, near here, in another outbreak of the unrest throughout the Ruhr, which German officials attribute to Communist agitators. One man was killed and one badly wounded.

London, April 24th.—It is the intention of the Board of Trade that the British trade service shall serve Canadian interests equally with the interest of the Motherland, so Sir Phillip Lloyd-Greame, President of the Board of Trade, stated in an address before the Canadian Club here today.

Dublin, April 25th.—John R. Etchingham, ex-Dail Eireann Minister of Fisheries, died at Wexford on Monday night. Mr. Etchingham was a supporter of Eamonn De Valera. He was sentenced
