FROM THE POLICE.

ALL owners of dogs are enjoined within the ending of January month to procure from the Police Office (for Kingshill District from Kingshill Police Station) the signs for dogs prescribed by the Police Regulations, which according to same must always be worn by the dog, and for which Franes 10.00 must be paid for the dogs in town and Franes 2.00 for those in the country.

After said time dogs met not wearing the sign for 1922 will be caught and brought to the Police Office (Kingshill Police Station) and detained for 3 times 24 hours, when it will be killed, unless the owner appears to claim the dog, pays a fine of Franes 15.00, and eventually procure the required sign.
