OFFICIAL NEWS.

Dec. 1, 1919.

Governor Oman left St. Thomas on the U. S. S. Vixen this morning to make an inspection of Culebra, San Juan, and El Gaey, Porto Rico. He is expected to return the latter part of the week.

Commander F. B. Colby, Supply Corps, U. S. N., and Lieutenant J. M. Keller and Mrs. Keller en route to St. Thomas arrived at San Juan on the S. S. Brazos.

The Dutch Cruiser Zedrand is due at San Juan on December 4th and will leave there on the 6th. for St. Thomas.

The Navy won the annual football game from the Army on Saturday by a score of 6 to 0, Navy two field goals.

Opening of the new—"The Danish Club"—will take place tonight. The rooms of the Club will be those formerly used by the defunct "West End Club."

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Nov. 28th. Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria has been placed as a candidate for the Presidency of Bavaria in the elections to be held in February or March.

Washington, Nov. 28th.—Seizure of bituminous coal mines, where the owners do not show a disposition to cooperate, in increasing production, and the use of troops to protect all miners who desire to work, has been decided upon by the Govt. in an effort to end the bituminous coal strike, it was stated today officially. In mines seized by the Govt. the 14 per cent wage advance agreed upon by the Cabinet, will be put into immediate effect, it was said. Three plans of the Govt. were agreed upon by the Cabinet last Wednesday, officials said, so as to meet the situation resulting from a refusal of the operators or miners, or both to agree to the Govt. wage increase proposal.

Plymouth, Nov. 28th.—Lady Astor was elected to Parliament for the Sutan Division of Plymouth, in the balloting of November 15th. The results were announced after a count of the ballots here today. The vote stood: Lady Astor, Unionists, 14,495, W. J. Gay, Labourer, 9,292. Isaac Foote, Liberal, 4,139.

London, Nov. 23th.—Great Britain has given Jugo-Slavia assurances that the Adriatic question will soon be taken up by the Supreme Council and that Great Britain's influence will be used to secure a just and equal table settlement, in accordance with the life and interests of Jugo-Slavia, according to private despatches.

London, Nov. 23th.—In the bye-election in the Isle of Thanet Division of Kent on Saturday Nov. 15th, Mr. Edmond Harmsworth, Unionist, polled 9,711 votes, defeating Capt. West, Liberal, who received 7,058.

Paris, Nov. 28th.—The German delegation today delivered two Notes to Mr. Paul Dumasta Secretary of the Peace Conference. One relates to the replacement of the German warships sunk by their crews in Scapa Flow, and the other to the repatriation of German prisoners.

Madrid, Nov. 28th.—Spain has broken off all relations with the Soviet Govt. of Russia, it was announced in the Cortes today, by the Minister of Foreign Affairs who said this step has been taken because the Spanish Embassy had been twice attacked and the Charge Affaires forced to leave Russia. Socialist Deputy Senor Savorit protested against this action, which, he declared to be "tyrannical."

Washington, Nov. 28th.—Mexico has replied with an argumentative diplomatic refusal to the American Govt's demand for the immediate release of Mr. Jenkins, the Consular Agent, imprisoned at Puebla. The official note was delivered here yesterday, but not made public.
