PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

3rd Member for Frederiksted Country District (M. M. Skeock) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The Government is misguided as to roadholders I have seven carts working on my allotment on the center line road, and yet up to this time I have not been able to complete the repairs necessary. At present I am getting gravel from Enfield Green Gut, but I am told by the owner of the estate if I continue to take gravel there for any length of time or much longer, he would have to stop giving the gravel. We have no gravel pits where we can get gravel, and to put a man to break stones with a hammer would be a great expense. The only way we would be able to obtain gravel to mend the road is to have a stone crusher. The road is put to hard use today and needs good materials, and the automobiles are very destructive to the roads.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata): Mr. Chairman. I wish to ask one question as I think it would facilitate the discussion on the bill—Is the Frs. 150,000 called for in the bill to be taken from the Treasury or the Immigration Fund?

that Paragraphs, 4, 5 and 6 place this road for all times under the care and maintenance of the Public Works Department. The centerline road will be unduly benefitted if all the automobile fees collected for the island were used for that particular road. If the provision that the road be placed under the Public Works Department all the time were eliminated the bill will meet with a great deal more favor.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen): Mr. Chairman. I would like to ask Government Secretary a question, and that is, who he thinks should have authority over the road if not the Public Works Department? That's where the difficulty comes in—For the Municipality to take care of all the roads, we feel that it is impossible and not necessary for so far the centerline could justly be placed under the care of the Public Works Department, and if the amount collected from automobiles is in excess of the amount required to maintain the road, that would make no difference, it would revert to the Treasury.

4th Member for Frederiksted Country District (Fleming) remarked: Mr. Chairman. If the amount collected from the automobiles is in excess of the amount required to take care of the road the balance could be put into a fund and used for repairing other roads on the island.

No one requesting the word further it was put to the vote and unanimously carried that the bill be furthered.

The Chairman remarked: The bill is furthered to be entered on the Order of the Day for the next meeting.

There being no further business before the House the Chairman declared the meeting closed at 3.45 p. m.

American Red Cross.

President Harding was reelected president at the annual meeting of the American Red Cross held at National Headquarters on December 7. At this meeting the by-laws were amended to provide that in the future the President of the United States shall be president ex-officio of the Red Cross. Other national officers reelected were Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Robt. W. de Forest, vice presidents; James M. Beck, counselor, and Miss Mabel T. Boardman, secretary. Eliot Wadsworth, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, was appointed Treasurer to succeed John Skelton Williams, while Mrs. Henry T. Rea of Pittsburgh, Pa., Gustavus D. Pope of Detroit, Mich., and Stuart A. Seelye of New Orleans were elected to the Central Committee.
