TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, June 20th.—An ex-Army officer intends to make an attempt to reach the North Pole by air, now that Ronald Amundsen has abandoned his scheme, the newspapers announce today.

Jerusalem June 21st.—It is reported that 9,000 Wahabi warriors have attacked and annihilated the garrison at Kariyahmilh. Despatches received here says the Trans-Jordanian Government requested the Beni Sacher tribe to attack the Wahabis, but the tribesmen refused to act unless the government forces cooperated with them.

London, June 21st.—Developments of great importance are pending in Franco-German relations, says an article printed in the Daily Telegraph today. The writer asserts that the German Government has taken practical steps to determine a method which without prejudicing the position of Great Britain, would lead to direct conversations between Paris and Berlin. The neutral countries of Central Europe are being used as bases from which feelers to this end are going out. The writer represents the German Government as especially anxious, because it seems that its policy in the Ruhr is gradually slipping from its control. The problem of passive resistance may be boiled down practically to a question of reinstating the expelled German officials, Berlin insisting on such a step and Paris as firmly refusing. At the present stage the conversations threaten to break down on this point.

Berlin, June 21st.—Dr. Herman Roehling, a German industrial magnate, is virtually interned in the Sarre region, according to a despatch to the Vossische Zeitung from Frankfurt on Main. The commission governing the Sarre has notified him that if he enters the Ruhr, or the Rhineland, the commission will deport him immediately. According to the newspaper, Dr. Roehling is unable to leave the Sarre, except through the occupied areas. The district German Government has sent a protest to the League of Nations, claiming the Sarre commissions order is a breach of the Versailles treaty, since it prevents Dr. Roehling from representing his interests personally before the council of the League of Nations.

Berlin, June 21st.—Five million Germans at present are receiving government unemployment relief. This fact was revealed by figures made public.
