TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 11th. It is stated that trade has so far improved that a number of British vessels will shortly leave Welsh ports with cargoes of metal manufactures bound for the Far East. It is understood that large orders for galvanized sheets have been placed in Great Britain on behalf of Far East importers during the past few days.

Washington, Oct. 11th.—The emergency tariff, instead of expiring November 27th would remain in effect until February 1st, under a bill favourably reported today by the House Ways and Means Committee. The life of the dye embargo will be extended, as well as the rates carried in the emergency act.

London, Oct. 11th—Labours programme for dealing with unemployment was submitted by a deputation at a meeting with Mr. Lloyd George and the cabinet's unemployment committee tonight. The programme, which has been somewhat revised since it originally was formulated, lays stress on the necessity for a comprehensive pooling policy and the financing of public works by the Government instead of by committees.

Bombay, Oct. 11th.—In the presence of a large gathering in the mill district here yesterday, Mahatma Gandhi, the Nationalist leader, solemnly set fire to a pile of foreign made clothing, in connection with the boycott against foreign importations. In a speech he referred to the arrest of the Ali brothers, held on a charge of sedition for attempting to cause disaffection among the troops. He said it was the duty of the Indians to inform the Sepoy that it was wrong to help a Government which had forfeited the confidence of the country. If the Sepoy was a believer in his faith, whether he was Hindu or Mussulman, he should leave the British service, even if he had to earn his living by breaking stones. Gandhi declared that failure to secure Home Rule by September 30th was the fault of his hearers. Much had been done in this direction, he added, but the minimum required had not been attained.

London, Oct. 11th.—The position of Ireland and the self-governing dominions of the British Empire was discussed at length by Viscount Grey, in a speech at Berwick in support of the candidature of Walter Runciman for election to the House of Commons in the seat formerly held by Viscount Grey. "I am not quite sure that we in this country generally quite endorse and realize what a partnership has come to mean" said Viscount Grey. "I am not sure that we realize all the consequence held this year in London with the British Government,
