LIMIT ON REMITTANCES BY MONEY ORDER TO SCANDINAVIAN COUNTRIES, THE NETHERLANDS AND SWITZERLAND, REMOVED.

The postmaster advises that the Postmaster General by Order No. 3411, directs that on and after the 15th day of August 1919, all restrictions heretofore imposed on the amount of money which remitters may forward by postal money orders for payment in Norway, Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, and Switzerland are hereby revoked.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Barbados, Aug. 20th.—H. M. transport Pannonia arrived here yesterday evening with West Indian troops on board. The Barbados draft on landing received the same hearty welcome that was extended to previous contingents.

St. Lucia, Aug. 21st.—Transport Pannonia arrived last evening and landed returned troops for St. Lucia and northern islands. They were heartily welcomed back and a dinner provided.

St. Thomas, Aug. 20th.—Communication with Demerara interrupted for all but Government and urgent messages. Traffic will be forwarded by mail and is subject to indefinite delay.

Grenada, August 21st.—Transport Pannonia arrived 2 p. m. and landed returned Grenada units of B. W. I. regiment who received a joyful welcome home.

Ponce, August 22nd.—Strong shock earthquake 4.55 a. m.

Paris, Aug. 13th.—(Associated Press). The Inter-Allied Supreme Council was summoned hastily today to meet to consider the Hungarian situation.

Vienna, Aug. 13th.—The fortress of Dubo, in Volynhia, has been captured from the Bolshevik forces by the Ukrainian army.

Jacksonville, Florida, Aug. 13.—More than a million eggs, hundreds of thousands of tins of canned foods and large quantities of sugar were seized today in a raid on the wholesale food warehouses and cold storage plants by Federal officers.

London, Aug. 13th.—Six Bolshevik battalions were destroyed in a successful Anglo-Russian offensive on the Dvin river on August 10th, the war officers announce today, and more than 1,000 prisoners, twelve guns and many machine-guns were captured.

London, Aug. 13th.—In the coal mines of Yorkshire, where more than 200,000 men have been on strike since July 21st, it was decided today to resume work. This action was taken at a mass meeting held at Barnsley.

Washington, Aug. 13th.—Senor Joaquin Tinoco, brother of the President of Costa Rica, was assassinated on Aug. 10th, according to report today to the State Department, no details being given. Whether President Tinoco is still in Costa Rica is not known by the State Department. He was reported recently to have asked for leave of absence from Congress, with the intention of leaving the country. Senor Joaquin Tinoca was his legal successor.

London, Aug. 13th.—The House of Commons this evening after a heated debate, adopted an amendment to the profiteering bill, empowering the Board of Trade, after investigation, to fix wholesale and retail prices. The vote was 132 to 95. The Amendment was denounced, among others, by Lord Robert Cecil, ex-Minister of War Trade,

who expressed amazement that the Govt. should accept an amendment destroying the whole basis of the bill and revolutionizing the trade of the country. Sir Donald Maclean, Liberal member, also denounced the amendment, characterizing it as "socialism of the rankest kind."

London, Aug. 13th.—Lord Grey is consenting to go to Washington temporarily, Mr. Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons today, in order to deal particularly with questions arising out of the peace settlement. He added that a permanent Ambassador to the United States would be appointed early next year, and that the House would share with the Govt. in appreciating the patriotic action of Viscount Grey which, in the opinion of the Govt., was of the highest value in its influence between the Govts. and the British and American people. In reply to Commander Kenworthy who asked why Lord Grey had not been appointed permanently, Mr. Bonar Law said the Government would be only too glad if Lord Grey would accept a permanent post but every one who knew of the former Foreign Secretary's abilities would share in the satisfaction over his present action. Mr. O'Connor asked what instructions would be given Lord Grey to improve relations between Great Britain and America by a settlement and conciliation of the Irish question, to which Mr. Law replied that he was sure Lord Grey would do all in his power to improve them in every respect where improvement was necessary.

London, Aug. 13th.—Sugar in stock on the 16th inst was 203,000 tons. Last year 211,000 tons.

San Juan, Aug. 22nd.—A strong shock of earthquake was felt here and in different parts of Porto Rico at 4.55 a. m. today. No damage reported.

Trinidad, Aug. 23rd.—The transport Pannonia arrived here yesterday morning with about 170 soldiers of the B. W. I. regiment and they received a welcome equal in warmth accorded previous returning units.

Rome, August 15th.—Hava's. The newspapers announce that through a recent financial agreement between Italy and Great Britain, Italy may cede to the British Government a part of the indemnity due her from Germany.

London, Aug. 15th.—The Bolshevik forces along the south shore of the Gulf of Finland, in the neighbourhood of Narva, have suffered reverses in fighting against the Estonians and the anti-Bolshevik troops, according to Bolshevik wireless despatches received here, which admit that the Soviet army in that region has been driven back to the Luga river.

Paris, Aug. 15th.—A new world's altitude record of 30,000 feet is said to have been established for the airplane with a passenger yesterday, by Lieut. Weiss at Villa Coublay, near here. The
