TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Liverpool, Aug. 30th.—No morning papers appeared in Liverpool today for the first time in 112 years, and no evening papers for the first time in 50 years as a consequence of a sudden strike of newspaper compositors here and in Manchester for more pay. For the first time in more than three quarters of a century the Manchester Guardian failed to appear.

London, Aug. 30th.—Another attack against Hilleh, west of the Euphrates River in Mesopotamia was launched by a force of 1,500 rebellious tribesmen last Thursday, but the attackers fell back under heavy shell fire, says an official statement issued by the War Office today. "The situation in the Muntifik area of Mesopotamia that is between the lower Tigris and the lower Euphrates, grows ominous", the statement continues: "A violent Holy War is being preached, and this tribe is expected shortly to throw in its lot with the insurgents. The situation around Samawa also gives rise to anxiety. Movements of rebel bands have been observed and renewed attacks on our posts are expected"

Winnipeg, Aug. 30th.—Winnipeg millers expected today to resume the manufacture of the pre-war grades of wheat flour on Wednesday, following the relinquishing of the control of the grain market by the Dominion Board. No more 95 per cent flour will be milled, they say. A drop of one dollar a barrel on the higher grades and \$1.50 on the Government's standard grades, is expected to result immediately. It was believed probable today that many of the millers in this district would resume full operations by the latter part of the week.

Paris, Aug. 30th.—The Foreign Office gives formal denial to an alleged agreement between France and General Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, made public yesterday by the London Daily Herald, the labour organ.

Paris, Aug. 30th.—Despatches from Constantinople today, report the massacre of 5,300 Armenians by Kurds in Anatolia. The Kurds shot the men but the women and children were locked in a church and burned to death, the despatch says.

New York, August 30th.—Forty-two steamship companies and freight brokers including virtually all the big trans-Atlantic lines were indicated by the Federal Grand Jury here on charges of conspiracy and restraint of trade in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. The indictments include the International Mercantile Marine, Atlantic Transport, Cunard, Anchor, Booth, American Shipping Corp., Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique, Kerr S. S. Co., members of the Trans-Atlantic Association Freight Conference and directors of the S. S. Freight Brokers Association.

London, Aug. 30th.—A more liberal policy toward Ireland has been formulated by Mr. Lloyd George and Sir Hamer Greenwood, according to reports from Lucerne. The recent conference in Dublin of leaders of the Moderate elements of the north and south of Ireland is given as the reason for the change of policy. The decision is understood to be two-fold. 1. Not to allow Mayor MacSweeney of Cork to die on hunger strike in a London prison. 2. To offer a liberal home rule measure to Ireland. Influential London newspapers, some of which usually speak with Government inspiration are invited in demanding Mr. MacSweeney's release. This may come before the Premier returns but it is understood that the home rule announcement will not be made until that time.

Honolulu, Aug. 31st.—The Prince of Wales arrived here yesterday on the Renown. No ceremony marked his arrival. He will remain three days.

Belfast, Aug. 31st.—Nine persons are dead as a result of yesterday's rioting in this city, another man being killed last night and two of those wounded in yesterday's disorders dying. Revised reports as to casualties show that since the rioting began last Wednesday 20 have been killed and 200 injured. A proclamation issued at Unionist headquarters says Sir Edward Carson has called on all loyal citizens to assist the authorities in quelling disturbances and restoring peace. Negotiations have been proceeding with the Government and an important statement is expected to be delivered to the Ulster Unionist Council on Friday. Meanwhile all loyalists are earnestly urged to exercise the utmost restraint and forbearance however great the provocation they may be subjected to and comply with the orders issued by the military authorities.

London, Aug. 31st.—Demands in support of which a majority of the miners of Great Britain have voted to strike, were considered here today, at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Miners' Federation, the Transport Workers Union and National Union of Railwaymen. Belief is expressed that as a result of the meeting, efforts will be made to resume negotiations with the Government.
