French Government informally proposed that the United States lead the way for the formation of an association of nations. Senator Harding in a speech last night, denied that the French Government has violated international proprieties.

New York, Oct. 18th.—A group of league of nations advocates left by special train last night to tour the Pacific coast, urging the election of Governor Cox.

Washington, Oct. 18th.—Advisory northeast storm warnings were dispatched early last night, the disturbance being in the extreme South of Florida. Northwest winds prevail with a disturbance apparently moving northwest to Florida strait.

Washington, Oct. 18th.—The Board of Inquiry appointed by Secretary Daniels to investigate the charge that American marines were guilty of illegal executions of Haitien natives is to convene on Friday. Secretary Daniels has ordered a sweeping investigation. The Board may visit Haiti for evidence.

London, Oct. 18th.—There is no sign of a break in the coal strike. All the mines are idle and the dislocation of industries is becoming widespread. There is no indication of Government mediation. Parliament meets today and is certain to discuss the strike. There is an unconfirmed report that the Government intends to offer the miners a compromise wage. There is an increase in the steel mills shut down.

London, Oct. 18th.—The Poles have abandoned Minsk and the Bolsheviks have reoccupied the city. The Bolsheviks under pressure are retreating to new positions in Sleatskia, in the Polesia regions.

Rome, Oct. 18th.—Anarchists yesterday attacked Aureleano Fort, near here. They were repulsed by soldiers after shots were exchanged.

London, Oct. 18th.—Lord Mayor Ma: Sweeney is worse, with symptoms of scurvy.

London, Oct. 19th.—There are no developments on the coal strike. The strikers have maintained order in the mining districts. Twenty-five thousand London transport workers are expected to join in the strike, and transport workers of all sections of the country may do likewise. Sailing of nearly all ships between Ireland and England have been cancelled to conserve coal and the railroads are restricting passenger service. The House of Commons is discussing the strike without bitterness. The Premier's speech was conciliatory but there is little hope of an immediate settlement of the dispute.

Athens, Oct. 18th.—The condition of King Alexander is reported as grave. A congestion of the lungs having developed in addition to the effect of the monkey bite.

Havana, Oct. 19th.—The effects of the moratorium decree are becoming more

pronounced. Commerce and industry of all descriptions are beginning to feel the pinch of the money shortage. Many are unemployed as the result of the inability of employers to obtain funds for pay rolls. High rates of interest are offered for money. President Menocal is studying the offers of American financiers to assist during the crisis. He expects to call a Cabinet meeting. The President says that a solution of the situation must be based on a guarantee of sugar crops.

General Superintendent's Office, St. Thomas, Oct. 19th.—The cable between San Juan, P. R., and Jamaica repaired, restoring communication with Jamaica and all points beyond via this Company's lines.

St. John, Oct. 15th.—The Atlantic sugar refinery here is closed indefinitely presumably because of the sugar crisis. Some 600 men are out of work.
