TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Warsaw, Dec. 10th.—Gabriel Narutowicz, Minister of Foreign Affairs, was elected President of Poland by the National Assembly today.

London, Dec. 11th.—Adjournment of the Premiers' conference tonight for eight days, in order to avert an open rupture between Great Britain and France over the question of German reparations, has been virtually decided upon. The Cabinet rejected the measures of force for the Rhur district upon which M. Poincaré insisted. Mr. Bonar Law informed M. Poincaré that British public opinion was overwhelmingly opposed to any military measure against Germany.

Moscow, Dec. 11th.—A non-aggression pact, providing for an arbitration board, has been fully agreed upon by the limitation of armaments conference here, attended by delegates of Russia and the border States of Russia.

Ottawa,—December 11th.—The postal convention between the United States and Canada, arising out of the recent Postal International Conference, has been practically approved by the United States Postal Authorities, it was learned here this morning.

Vienna, Dec. 11th.—A noisy demonstration by unemployed, in which it is estimated that 50,000 persons took part, caused a practical suspension of business here today. The police in large numbers finally held the throngs out of the inner city. It is estimated that there are more than 100,000 now unemployed in Vienna alone and the number is constantly increasing.

Warsaw, Dec. 11th.—Rioting, in which there was loss of life and injury to many persons, marked the ceremony of the swearing in of Gabriel Narutowicz as President of Poland today.
