1000 AT GRAVE OF ROOSEVELT

First Of Annual Pilgrimages To Oyster Bay Is Made

RICH AND POOR MINGLE IN THROG

New York, Jan. 6th.--Nearly a thou-

sand visitors went to the grave of Col. Roosevelt at Oyster Bay today for the first of the annual pilgrimages to his resting place. The slow procession up the steep incline to the grave started early in the morning, and when dusk cloaked the square inclosure on the summit there were still a few lingerers.

Col. William Royce Thompson, president of the Roosevelt memorial committee, and Hermann Hagedorn personally laid a wreath on the grave on behalf of the committee.

FROM THE WOMEN'S COMMITTEE

Mrs. John Hays Hammond and Mrs. Henry A. Wise Wood came out with another on behalf of the women's Roosevelt memorial committee. Other wreaths were from Julius Holz, Charles Lee and the convention of Jewish Juniors. Individual flowers were strewn all around, thrown into the enclosure by visitors.

Men bared their heads to the cold air as they stood silently regarding the grave. Here and there a woman knelt praying. Well known stories about the colonel passed from one to the other, just as if they had never been told before. Rich and poor, young and old, were there. Limousines lined the roadway overlooking Long Island sound all day long, but pedestrians came in the greatest numbers.

Executive Order No. 9.

THE following additional Regulations governing the sale of bay rum promulgated in pursuance of law, will be effective within the Virgin Islands of the United States on and after February 1, 1920:

Bay Rum shall be sold only on delivery of a permit issued by the Police Department.

Applicants for permit must satisfy the Police Department that the applicant will not use the bay rum for beverage purposes.

Section 4 of Executive Order No. 2, dated July 7th, 1919, wherein such sales were authorized upon the buyer's prior delivery to the seller of an application to purchase, is hereby amended accordingly.
