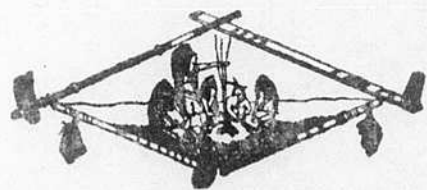

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Jamaica, July 29th.—The Governor has notified the press that the Prince of Wales will arrive at Jamaica on the 15th of September and will remain ashore until some time on Saturday the 18th, thus enabling His Royal Highness to present colours to the West India Regiment and the Jamaica Battalions of the British West Indies Regt. and to spend two clear days in travelling the country districts.

Berlin, July 28th.—The Reichstag today by an overwhelming majority approved of the agreement made recently by the Govt. at Spa with the representatives of the Entente.

Belfast, July 28th.—Donegal this morning was making frantic appeals to Londonderry for food supplies; these, however, could not be delivered because trainmen refused to move trains with military on board and the military insisted upon occupying the trains. A train which was stopped at Letterkenney on Monday by Sinn Feiners because it was transporting troops was still there today with the military guarding it. Masked men early this morning held up the Belfast-Dublin train at Newry and took away the mails.

Ostend, July 28th.—The United States Polo Team defeated the Belgians 13 to 3 in the Olympic contest this afternoon. The games between the British and Spanish teams have been postponed until Saturday.

Wallangarra, Queensland, July 27th.—On the arrival of the Royal train at Wallangarra the Queensland border township yesterday morning, the Prince of Wales was met and welcomed to Queensland by Lieut. Governor Lennon of Queensland and also by Acting Premier Fihelly. At Cottonvale the Prince's party proceeded to the returned soldiers settlement re-named Amiens, passing through areas

of virgin bush bearing signboards of the names Pozieres, Bullecourt, Bapaume and Messines. At Amiens the Prince inspected 150 ex-soldiers engaged in the tough task of cleaning their leaseholds for orchards. The settlers have had a severe drought to contend against but appeared cheerful. The great majority have English brides with them. The Prince was heartily received. They cheered him as he walked among the settlers asking questions concerning their conditions and prospects.

Constantinople, July 28th.—The Bolshevik army advancing from Baku through Armenia, took Croucha, 264 miles southwest of Baku, virtually unopposed, as well as Gerousi, 24 miles northwest of Croucha, the next important town on the waggon route to the Tabriz railway. In Baku the Bolsheviks are training a large Armenian Communist army to assist in the overthrow of the Armenian republic. British warships have seized a Russian ship from Nikollev at Trebizond carrying Bolshevik arms and ammunition for the Nationalists.

Stockholm, July 29th.—Germany is trying to export by way of Sweden two hundred thousand nauser rifles and the Swedish Govt. has been asked to give its consent to their importation with the understanding that they are intended for exportation to Mexico. Application to this end has been made to the Foreign Office. Stockholm newspapers declare that this looks like a suspicious transaction an express the opinion that the Govt. will decline to give its permission.

London, July 29th.—Women jurors were empanelled in England for the first time yesterday when six women formed a part of the jury in the Bristol quarter sessions. The women sat throughout the day and heard six cases tried but at the close of the proceedings two of them who were mothers asked to be excused from further service owing to the claim upon them by their children. The judge granted the request and two other women immediately volunteered and were selected.

Springfield Mass, July 29th.—Vardon and Ray, the British golfers, easily defeated Breach and Toole of the Springfield County Club over the course yesterday afternoon winning nine holes to their opponents one in a eighteen holes best ball match. Ray turned a score of 71, two over the course record of 69.

New York, July 29th.—Shamrock IV left Sandy Hook shortly after noon today for an anchorage in the Hudson River. The challenger was still flying her little green flag and passing steamers gave her almost a continuous ovation of whistle salutes. Sir Thomas Lipton said today that he had not made up his mind what he would do with the racer and the trial boat, the 23 metre Shamrock.
