LOCAL.

The Vigilant with St. Thomas mails arrived here yesterday morning after a trip of nearly 100 hours. The Creole resumes the performance of the mail-service this week and leaves this port for St. Thomas to-day, wind permitting.

The Virginia with a large United States mail got to Frederiksted at noon yesterday and 22 sacks of the Christiansted portion of the mail were received here last evening. The remainder is expected by midday today.

Some unidentified person or persons absconded with Mr. Louis Lindquist's horse and buggy which was tethered at a residence in Church Street on Saturday night. After driving about in it it is reported that the buggy was wrecked and abandoned up town, the horse being allowed to run away and up to yesterday not to be found.

The Navy Band entertained the public with a popular concert in the band-

U. S. PRESS NEWS.

WASHINGTON: Five of the seven members of the New Shipping Board created by the Merchant Marine Act were appointed yesterday by President Wilson. Admiral Benson, Chief of Naval Operations during the war, was re-appointed chairman, the other four members are Alderic I. Thompson of Mobile Ala., Gavin McNab of San Francisco, Martin J. Gallin of Wisconsin and Theodore Marburg of Baltimore. Only one of the five members named is a republican and since the law specifies that only four of the seven members may be named from any one political party, the remaining two appointees must be republicans.

CLEVELAND, OHIO: George Jiggs who is said to be under indictment in many States on charges of murder and robbery is under arrest in a local hospital, shot through the neck as the result of a street battle at Bedford ten miles from here late today, which resulted in the death of one bandit, the serious wounding and capture of two others and probable fatal shooting of a bank clerk. More than two hundred shots were fired. The battle was the culmination of one of the most spectacular bank robberies ever staged in this State during which eight bandits held up Bedford branch of the Cleveland Trust Company.

LONDON: British labor and the country as a whole waited anxiously today for the government's decision on the deadlock over the coal miners strike following the strike ultimatum delivered by the railwaymen yesterday and an almost pointed threat from the transport workers. The miners conference of South Wales today asked the national miners federation to call a national conference to consider the withdrawal of all labor from the coal mines. The mines are being kept in order by specially assigned forces.

ANNAPOLIS: William Tush will continue as coach of baseball and basketball at the Naval Academy, the new agreement covering three years. He will begin with the basketball squad shortly.

LONDON: Terence MacSweeney has been in a semi-conscious state all morning. He only recognized his sister. Prison officials continue to force food in his mouth while delirious.

SHERIDAN, WYOMING: Congress-

man Frank W. Mondell, republican floor leader has cancelled all speaking engagements for the remainder of the campaign because of a broken ankle he sustained two days ago according to a telegram received from republican state headquarters here. The telegram said Mr. Mondell was in intensive pain and would be confined to the hospital for a week or ten days.

NEW YORK: Florence Wieler, who according to federal authorities, recently was indicted in Nashville, on a charge of conspiracy to dispose of nineteen thousand dollars worth of platinum stolen from the Army Ordinance Bureau, was arrested here today by federal agents.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Oct. 19th.—Members of the National Council of the French Miners Federation will meet here on October 22nd. to consider demands for an immediate advance in wages. The rate to be demanded is as yet unknown but it is understood to vary between four and five francs per day. It is indicated the companies will be given a very brief time in which to answer and that in case of refusal a strike will be called.

Sebastopol, Oct. 9th.—The efforts of Genl. Wrangel to take the Kakhovaka Bridgehead have resulted in failure with heavy losses to his forces in killed and wounded and in material captured by the Bolsheviks. The killed included the General commanding the Barbovitch Cavalry Corps. General Wrangel's troops have been thrown back into the Taurida area behind the Dneiper which they still control. Leon Trotsky is said to be personally directing the campaign from Orel. Genl. Wrangel's army has repulsed a Soviet attack at Oriekiev, 73 miles southeast of Ekaterinoslav and has captured 3,000 prisoners, according to reports reaching this city.

London, Oct. 16th.—The cessation of coal mining through the country seems complete, for although the miners in some districts appeared to have entered the strike in a half-hearted manner there is no sign yet of any break in the ranks of the men and consequently the dislocation of the country's industry is becoming widespread, nor is there any indication of mediation growing out of today's various conferences, all parties apparently awaiting the re-assembling of Parliament tomorrow when it is expected the discussion of the strike will displace the Irish Home Rule Bill which was the first schedule before the House of Commons. The strike will hit the iron, steel and cotton industries seriously. The great blast furnaces in Middlesbrough district are already beginning to damp down and thousands of furnace men and steel workers are idle. This three-sided district provided a third of
