TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Warsaw, Sept. 30th.—Polish forces captured Lida, an important town 45 miles south of Vilna, and Pinsk, a fortified city ninety miles east of Brest-Litovsk, on Thursday, according to an official statement issued here. The Polish advance towards the northeast is continuing, and the fall of Vilna, the Lithuanian Capital, is expected within a few days. Kamanetz-Podolva, a city on the northern bank of the Dnieper river in Ukraina, had been recovered by Ukrainian troops from the Bolsheviks. It was at Lida, now again in Polish hands, that Leon Trotsky was recently reported to have established the headquarters of a new Bolshevik arm of ninety thousand men, designed for use in an Autumn offensive against the Poles. The reports from the front show that the Polish Ukrainian forces are advancing along the line. In the centre, the Poles have reached Slonim and crossed the river, destroying the 21st Bolshevik Division and capturing nine guns. In Polesia the Poles smashed the Fourth Bolshevik Army, the reports state, taking 3,000 prisoners including all the staff officers with the exception of the Commander-in-Chief and wresting Pinsk from the Soviet forces. Between Pinsk and Grodno in Volhynia, Polish troops have occupied the railway junction of Sarny.

London, Sept. 30th.—It is expected that the Imperial conference will be postponed until 1922, owing to difficulties among
