ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Dec. 6th.—A Madrid despatch to the Central News says political and diplomatic circles foreshadow an approaching union of the nations of Western Europe, comprising Great Britain, France, Spain, Belgium and Portugal, which is regarded as a positive guarantee for the future. The correspondent says his opinion was gathered from the speeches made at the reception in the Palace to Sir Esme Howard, the new British Minister.

Paris, Dec. 6th.—In a Note framed by the Supreme Council today, it is demanded that Germany sign the protocol, providing for the carrying out of the Peace Terms, failing which the Allies, it is set forth, will be obliged to have recourse to military measures.

Paris, Dec. 6th.—The recent reference of Mr. Lloyd George to the probable settlement of the Turkish Empire's future, at a Conference of representatives of the Allied and associated Powers in London, has caused much comment in French official circles here today. However, it is learned that the French Government has not yet consented to the transfer to London of peace negotiations affecting Turkish and Asia Minor Questions.

Liverpool, Dec. 6th.—Lord Robert Cecil, in a speech, said he did not think the suggested alliance between the United States, France and Great Britain, guaranteeing assistance for France in case of future aggression by Germany, would materialize. Such alliances, Lord Robert declared, always broke down when they were wanted.

Washington, Dec. 6th.—President Wilson yesterday reserved judgement on the Mexican situation until he could examine evidence submitted by Senator Fall of New Mexico, on which the Senator based his charges that the Mexican Embassy and Consuls in the United States had distributed Red propaganda in the U. S. A. Senators Fall and Hitchcock conferred with the President for nearly an hour. Senator Fall said in reply to questions that he was entirely satisfied with the President's condition, and with his ability to handle the Mexican situation. While the President did not say directly that he would communicate with Congress on the Mexican Situation, the Senator gained the impression that he would have some advice to give, before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee meets on Monday.

New York, Dec. 6th.—A prize of \$100,-

000 has been offered for the invention of an aeroplane which will raise and land vertically, it was learned here today. The offer made by Edouard and Andre Michelin, French Type Manufacturers, through the Aero-Club of America a machine which can take off from the roofs of medium sized houses and land at the same place is desired. It is also specified in the terms that the winning machine must have the greatest possible range of speed up to 134 miles per hour.
