St. Thomas News

We are glad to mention that according to latest report, Rev. Romig is slightly improving.—*The Bulletin, Sept. 2nd.*

On Saturday, the large marine launch with a party on board went out fishing with the intention of returning to port on Sunday noon. As the launch did not show up at the appointed time, and it having been reported that she had met with an accident somewhere off Little Saba, Lt. Applegate, Captain of the Navy Yard dispatched the large naval motor boat to render assistance. This rescuing party searched diligently for several hours, but owing to the darkness, the marine launch could not be located. The attempt having thus proved unsuccessful, His Excellency the Governor confided the task to the "Grebe" and the mentioned tug started out at about 8:30 P. M. on her mission. The "Grebe" cruised around the whole night illuminating the water shores and islets with her searchlight, but also failing to locate the missing launch returned

at foreday.

At an early hour this morning, the "Grebe" again started out to renew the search and succeeded in locating the party near Botany Bay. The report, which was by wireless, stated that the party was safe and attempts were being made to salvage the launch.—*The Bulletin Sept. 24th.*

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Geneva, Sept. 25th.—That speed is the guiding principle in the League of Nations determination to have its covenant subjected to juridical interpretation, was evinced tonight by the fact that the special committee of legal experts had already framed its preliminary report. This examination was decided upon because of Italy's refusal to admit the competence of the covenant with respect to her recent dispute with Greece. The experts reported that they had drawn up five questions. These have not been made public, but it is understood that three of them directly concern the League's competency. One refers to the responsibility of states for political crimes committed within their border. Multitudinous problems occupied five of the League Commissions today. They sat simultaneously at the League headquarters, but the most troublesome problem of all was that definitely fixing the method whereby non-permanent members of the Council shall be elected. The system of election has never been clearly outlined and today's deliberations brought no further light. The Council now is composed of four permanent members, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. The six non-permanent members are, Spain, Belgium, Brazil, China, Uruguay, and Sweden. The permanent members are elected yearly, as the amendment that only two should go out every year was never ratified. Both Poland and Czechoslovakia are campaigning for seats on the Council, and it is generally expected that M. Benes, of Czechoslovakia, will be elected. China probably will lose her seat. The French today proposed the abolition of the temporary mixed commission of the League which handles questions on disarmament, on the ground that it contains no representation of the Governments and therefore can achieve nothing concrete in armament reduction. Lord Cecil opposed the French suggestion and the Council came to no decision. The proposal of Augustin Edwards, of Chile, that all Governments be asked to extend all possible facilities to boy scouts and girl guides in their travels was enthusiastically approved. An Australian women delegate was applauded when she said that 25,000 Mohammedans are affiliated with the boy scout organization. The assembly of the League held one of the most dramatic sessions in its history today, when by one hostile vote, that of Persia, the reso-
