TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Hamilton, Ont., Jan. 29th.—Mr. Macaulay, yesterday, delivered an address before the Canadian Manufacturers Association, which was followed by a resolution asking the Dominion Govt to enquire of the West Indian Governments how it was possible for these two parts of the Empire to assist each other by increasing co operation. Mr. Macaulay's subject was "Canada and the West Indies". He said it was virtually necessary that the different parts of the Empire should co-operate, otherwise it would be long before the United States would be the owners of much of the Empire, and he declared that various parts of the Empire would form a sort of partnership and buy as much as possible from each other, they would owe less to the United States and have a lower rate of exchange.

Milan Jan. 29th.—Further surprising developments are reported in connection with the Fiume affair. The Government despatched a steamer with stores for the army of occupation in Albania, but, instead, she proceeded to Fiume, where Gabriel D'Annunzio seized the cargo and two million lire which the War Office intended for the payment of the Albanian troops. D'Annunzio justifies his act of sequestration on the ground of the extreme necessity of his followers, who are clamouring for their pay.

London, January 29th.—The "Central News" Manchester correspondent reports that in anticipation of the termination of the present wage agreement at the end of March, the cotton mill workers are preparing

New York, Jan. 29th.—There has been a further material increase of influenza and pneumonia cases in New York City, but the peak of the epidemic, it is stated, will not be reached for several days. The total number of influenza cases reported up to today was four thousand seven hundred and six, and of pneumonia six hundred and forty-nine. Deaths from influenza one hundred, and from pneumonia one hundred and thirty-six.

Paris, Jan. 29th.—According to the "Temps" M. Millerand has sent a telegram to Genl. Janin, Commander of the Czechs in Siberia, demanding an immediate explanation of his action in handing over Genl. Kolchak to the Siberian revolutionary forces and requested him to secure his immediate release.

Barbados, Feb. 4th.—At yesterday's meeting of the House Assembly the speaker read to the House a letter from His Excellency the Governor announcing the receipt of a telegram from the Secretary of State that His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, in the course of his contemplated visit to Australia and New Zealand would proceed via Panama Canal both outward and on return and

would pay a visit to Barbados on the way out.
