American Red Cross.

WASHINGTON, April.—An appropriation of \$10,000 has been granted the Vladivostok Chapter of the American Red Cross by National Headquarters for immediate relief work among Russian refugees in Siberia. Cabled advices report ten thousand of these refugees wholly destitute and aid was asked until the July harvest.

"Although much suffering was expected in this district during the winter", reports the Chairman of the Vladivostok Chapter, "we were not prepared for the great increase in the number of refugees. They have come in from European Russia and the interior of Siberia until it is estimated there are now about 30,000 in or near Vladivostok."

"The Government has been housing them in the old military barracks and are trying to give them one meal a day but it is now no longer able to do this. One group of Cossacks and their families have been living for six months in fifty-two railway cars. They have been supplied with nothing but a weekly ration of flour and have appealed to the American Red Cross for clothing and other provisions."

American Red Cross Chapters in the Far East have been asked to aid the Vladivostok Chapter within the limit of their resources. The Japan chapter is

the first to respond to this appeal. It contributed five hundred yen.

St. Thomas News

The Committee appointed by the Colonial Council to report on Draft of Additional Money Bill to the Budget for the Municipality of St. Thomas and St. Jan, providing for defraying the expenses of sending delegates to Washington, met at 8 o'clock. The Hon. Govt. Secretary and other members of the Council also attended the meeting.

Present were the chairman and Vice-chairman, Messrs. Thiele and Kuntz, respectively and members Burnet, Corneiro Daniel, de Jongh, Morehead, Francis, Knud-Harsen and Smith. As aforesaid, the government was represented by Lt. Com. J. J. Gaffney.

The 7th elected member (Corneiro) presided as Chairman of the Committee and after considerable discussion, in which all present took part, the report was framed and was presented to-day at the meeting of the Council.—*St. Thomas Bulletin*, April 20th.

Ricardo Allen who was arraigned before Judge Williams yesterday morning and charged with assaulting a man with a deadly weapon, was found guilty and was sentenced to one month in prison.

TELEGRAM

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, April 20th.—Little hope for tangible results in the direction of peace was expressed on resumption today of the peace conference between the Free Staters and Republicans, although Lord Mayor O'Neil and Archbishop Byrne have exerted themselves to the utmost, since the adjournment last week, to bring about an understanding. The public, is generally skeptical of results, and therefore is showing little interest in the meeting at the Mansion House. The Lord Mayor, while expressing in a statement yesterday the hope that peace might come in the near future, refrained from predicting that it would be achieved at the conference, and added, that should the meeting fail, an early combination of the forces of capital and labour might be looked for in an effort to obtain order. Labour leaders are reported to have been conferring for the last few days with both the heads of the Provisional Government and the Republican and may be represented at today's meeting although it is not certain. It seems considerably in doubt however whether labour would combine with capital, in the circumstances suggested, as Irish
