PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

Item 2.

Colonial Council Bill No. 45.

Introduction of and 1st Discussion
on Colonial Council Bill No. 45, Reso-
lution, introduced by Government
transferring furniture and equip-
ment to the Post Office Department.

The bill reads as follows.

Colonial Council Bill No. 45.

2nd Council, 2nd Session 1920-1921.

DRAFT OF RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the Colonial
Council for St. Croix in session as-
sembled:

1. The Governor is hereby author-
ized to transfer, by gift, all of the
furniture, equipment, etc. owned by
this Municipality, now in use by the
Post Offices at Christiansted and
Frederiksted, to the Proper Postal
authorities

By direction of the Governor.

Despatching Secretary (Commander
Colby) remarked: Mr. Vice-Chairman.
Colonial Council Bill No. 45 refers to the
transferring of furniture and equipment
from the ownership of the Municipality
to the Post Office Department.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) re-
marked: Mr. Vice-Chairman. This Reso-
lution was before the Municipal Commit-
tee and it was favorably recommended to
the Council. I have here inventories
of the furniture and equipment in the
Post Offices of Christiansted and Fred-
eriksted; if it is desirable they could be
read, if not, they could be passed around
to Members. (The inventory was hand-
ed to the Vice-Chairman to be passed
around to members). The furniture and
equipment in the Post Offices are not of
any use to the Municipality and there-

fore I see no reason why they should not
be transferred.

2nd Appointed Member (Noll) entered
the meeting.

It was then put to vote and unanimous-
ly agreed upon that the Resolution be
furthered and passed at one discussion.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: During
the discussion in the Municipal Commit-
tee it was thought that the furniture and
fixtures were of very little value to the Mu-
nicipality. The Christiansted inventory is
very lengthy, but there is no item of any
value on it, it amounts to about \$60.00,
and on the Frederiksted inventory there
are about 12 items, the value of which
will not exceed \$50.00.

The inventories were passed around to
Members by the Acting Secretary.

No one requesting the word further,
the Discussion closed and the Acting
Secretary read the Resolution and the
Vice-Chairman put same to the vote

It was unanimously adopted.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: The
Resolution is adopted and goes to Gov-
ernment.

Item 3.

Colonial Council Bill No. 46.

Introduction of and 1st Discussion
on Colonial Council Bill No. 46, Draft
of an Ordinance introduced by Gov-
ernment providing a Code of Sani-
tary Laws for St. Croix.

Despatching Secretary (Commander
Colby) remarked: Mr. Vice-Chairman.
The Government does not believe any re-
mark on the Sanitary Regulations is ne-
cessary.

The Vice-Chairman remarked: 1st Dis-
cussion on the bill is open.

2nd Appointed Member (Noll) remark-
ed: Mr. Vice-Chairman. These Sanitary
Regulations have been before a commit-
tee of nine members of this Council in the
latter part of last year; and at that time,
I can state as Chairman of that Commit-
tee, that there was considerable differ-
ence of opinion concerning the advisabil-
ity of certain features of the bill. I can
state also that this Draft of Ordinance
will require considerable consideration
before final action is taken upon it, there-
fore I move that a committee be appoint-
ed by the Council to receive and consider
the Draft of Ordinance which is now be-
fore us; as to the size of the Committee I
have no suggestion to offer.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country
District (Andersen) remarked: Mr. Chair-
man. I happened to be a member of the
Committee on the Sanitary Regulations.
I have carefully read the one before us
today and I find it is nearly the same as
the former. I think it will be impossi-
ble to have the code considered favorably
as it stands before us, therefore I re-
commend that it be changed before it
is brought before the Council; and
since it will go through many meetings
before it is passed, I suggest that the
code be reconsidered before the com-
mittee is appointed.
