ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, April 3rd.—Prince Sixte of Bourbon-Parma, brother of the Ex-Empress Zita, has left for Funchal, with the intention of bringing back the former Sovereign and her children with him.

Funchal April 3rd.—The funeral of the Ex-Emperor Charles will take place on Wednesday at four p. m. in the Parish Church here and will be of an impressive character.

Washington, April 3rd.—At a meeting of the council of the Pan-American Union to take place on Wednesday next the Chilean Ambassador will present a request from his Government for the holding of the next meeting in March 1923 at Santiago (Chili).

Budapest, April 3rd.—Yesterday was observed as a day of national mourning by decree of the Government.

New York, April 4th.—Adolfo De La Huerta, a former President of Mexico and now Secretary of the Treasury, will shortly visit this city for the purpose of a conference, with a committee of International Bankers with regard to the Foreign debt of Mexico and its re-adjustment.

Washington, April 4th.—The House committee were yesterday informed by Mr. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers of America, that until the operators fulfil their pledge concerning wage contracts, the bituminous miners were ready to prolong the strike indefinitely.

Budapest, April 4th.—In the course of a dinner attended by business men here last evening a bomb was thrown, by which three persons were killed and several injured.
