TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Constantinople, Nov. 7th.—According to reliable information, the Angora Government has renewed its demands for the evacuation of Constantinople and the departure of the Allied warships. The nationalists declare that the presence of the Allied troops and warships is incompatible with the nationalists administration of Constantinople. The French troops in the neighbourhood of Constantinople number about twelve thousand. The Turkish pound has fallen during the past week from seven hundred to nearly nine hundred piastres to the pound sterling,

which is the lowest point it has reached for the past two months, as well as in the last four years.

New York, Nov. 7th.—Ex-Governor Smith, rolling up the greatest plurality New York City has ever given any candidate in any election, today was swept back into the gubernatorial chair from which he had been ejected in 1920 by Governor Miller. Republicans not only admitted the defeat of Mr. Miller, but conceded that Mr. Calder had lost his seat in the Senate to Mr. Copeland, Health Commissioner of New York, formerly Mayor of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and until today an untested factor in New York politics. In the South, Senators Tremmel, of Florida, George, of Georgia, Stephens, of the Mississippi and Swanson, of Virginia, are elected. Senator George succeeds Mrs. W. H. Felton, appointed by Governor Hardwick to succeed the late Senator Watson. She was the first woman Senator, but never took her seat. She was not a candidate in today's election.

Boston, Nov. 7th.—Re-election of Governor Cox, Republican, was conceded late tonight by Mr. Fitzgerald, Democratic candidate for the Governorship. Mr. Fitzgerald sent a message to Governor Cox extending congratulations and best wishes.

Philadelphia, Nov. 7th.—Mr. Pinchot, Republican Candidate for Governor and the remainder of the Republican ticket in Pennsylvania were carried to victory in today's election. Returns from 4,091 districts out of 8,021 gave the forester a lead over Mr. Mosparan, his Democratic opponent, of more than 200,000. Mr. Wharton Pepper and Mr. Reed, Republican, the sitting member from Pennsylvania in the United States Senate by appointment, were also large majorities.

Boston, Nov. 7th.—Cotton was sold at 25 cents on the New York cotton exchange for the first time since October 1920. The advance since the first of the week amounts to nearly a cent a pound, which, added to the four cent rise during October, makes the present upswing one of the most spectacular in the history of the exchange. The short crop, probably under 10,000,000 bales, and the marked recovery in the demand for cotton goods, which has resulted in close to capacity operations by mills for the first time in two years, are the chief factors forcing the staple to new high prices.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—Imports from Canada to the United States increased in value, \$1,000,000 and exports to Canada declined, \$1,000,000 in September of this year, as compared with September 1921, according to foreign trade reports by the United States department.

San Francisco, Nov. 8th.—Defeat of the State prohibition enforcement act in California was indicated by returns from 465 precincts early today. The vote stood For 6,413 against 11,249.
