PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis)

After recess the Council reassembled and the Chairman again brought up Bill No. 24.

1st Member for Christiansted Country District [Stakemann] handed in an amendment to the Resolution which is as follows:

AMENDMENT

to Resolution for the disposal of East Hill School.

Proposed by first member for Christiansted Country District [Stakemann].

That be added thereto:

Provided however that the deed shall contain a provision to the effect that the Government may repossess itself to title of the property at any time for the same purchase sum.

1st Member for Christiansted Country District.

It was put to the vote and carried that the amendment be furthered and by unanimous consent of the Council the amount of \$1,000 as written in the bill was changed to Frs. 5,000.

No one requesting the word, the Secretary [Canegata] read the Resolution in its amended form and the Chairman put same to the vote.

14 members voted for; one member did not vote.

The Chairman remarked: The bill is adopted and goes to Government.

Item 5.

Interpellation to Government, introduced by 1st. Member for Christiansted Country District, (Stakemann) in regard to the re-opening of the Richmond Core-foot Hospital.

The Chairman remarked: The last item

on the Order of the Day is Item 5. Interpellation from 1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann). Before this can be brought forward it is necessary for the Council to give its consent for this matter to be discussed and the Interpellation put to the Government.

The Chairman then asked for a vote as to introducing the Interpellation.

13 members voted to put the Interpellation.

3 members did not vote.

Is the Governor aware of the fact that the Sick-House at Richmond commonly known as the Sore-Foot Hospital has been closed and the Inmates turned out?

Does the Government not see its way in having the said institution re-opened and the Patients re-admitted?

1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) took the word and said, Mr. Chairman as Honorable Members have already read the Interpellation it is not necessary for me to read it. All are aware that in December month the Sick-house at Richmond was closed and the inmates turned out. This has given a very sad impression to the community. The former inmates are suffering yet with sores on their bodies and I do not believe any of them are able to work to earn sufficient to live on. As far as I understand, it was stated that they have received pensions from the Poor Commission, but I do not know how much the pension is; even if they are receiving three dollars per month is not sufficient to support a man, woman, or even a child, considering that today a room cannot be rented for less than one dollar and a quarter per month, and the consequence is, they are going about the streets begging, and some are in such condition that people cannot refuse those who beg for alms. I do not know the reason why they are turned out, but it is said for want of means. Gentlemen it is only about six or seven months of the financial year that have passed, and if the amounts budgetted for the Richmond Sickhouse have already been used and none left, there must be something wrong, where, I do not know.

We see in the Budget for the present financial year under Richmond Sickhouse, Section 7, an amount of Frs. 21,120, and under Item 8, Equipment
