ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, Feb. 10th.—The difference between the railway management and employees which threatened to bring about a general strike on February 15th, have been arranged and it is announced that the question has been settled. For the past month, Ireland has been faced by a general railway strike the men asserting that their efforts were directed at resisting an attempt to force them back into a position of lower wages long hours and bad working conditions such as prevailed before the war.

London, Feb. 9th The Irish Free State Bill, designed to put into effect the terms of the Anglo Irish Treaty, was formally introduced in the House of Commons this afternoon by Mr. Austen Chamberlain, the Government leader. The bill was read for the first time and will be given a second reading next Thursday.

London, Feb. 9th.—Supplementary Civil Service estimates issued today shows that a sum of nearly 1,500,000 pounds will be required to be granted to the Irish provisional Government for compensation for criminal injuries pending the settlement between the Governments.

London, Feb. 9th.—Mr. Winston Churchill stated in the House of Commons this afternoon that it was impossible to give a date for the completion of the withdrawal of the British troops from Ireland.

London, Feb. 9th.—A bill has been introduced in the House of Commons by the Government providing for permanent summer time in the United Kingdom, beginning the last Saturday in March, and terminating the first Sunday in October of each year. These dates are fixed in agreement with France and Belgium.

London, Feb. 9th.—The Indian Government has ordered the immediate arrest of Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the non cooperationists in India, according to the Daily Sketch.

Paris, Feb. 9th.—The Premier in a note given out this evening addressed to the United States and France's Allies in the late war, declares that France will be unable to send delegates to the pro-
