The Postmaster is in receipt of a Government announcement, a copy of which is being displayed in the lobby of the post office, giving information to the public in regard to the opening and operation of army retail stores for the disposal of surplus household commodities, including a variety of new and unused articles, as well as quantities of reclaimed or renovated goods which will be sold through the retail store of the district in which the purchaser resides. The Virgin Islands does not appear among the States designated as retail districts, but presumably residents in this territory may also take advantage of the opportunity offered, and interested parties are invited to examine the lists of articles and prices at the post office.

The U. S. S. "Vixen" with His Excellency the Governor arrived here at noon yesterday and sailed again after the close of the Colonial Council meeting and a conference regarding the financial situation both of which were attended by the Governor.

It may interest the public to know that the bill to regulate and control the prices of foodstuffs passed the Colonial Council at its meeting yesterday.

It is gratifying to learn from all accounts that prices in general are more or less unchanged in most shops, with but few exceptions. The Apothecary Hall is reported as maintaining practically the same old price lists.

The funeral of former teacher Alexander Joseph last Saturday afternoon was largely attended by a representative gathering from both towns and the country.

Some boys are making it a practice at night to stone birds out of the trees near the Lutheran Church, and apart from the disturbance the neighborhood experiences through this unseemly pastime, people going by are liable to be struck. A discontinuance of such sport would be much appreciated.

It was a fine variety programme that was exhibited at the Theatre last night, opening with a "screen magazine" of interesting events in ancient and modern history, and concluding with an exceptionally taking comic, the serial entitled The Bull's Eye being the main feature of the night. The attendance was more or less good, but not commensurate with the expensiveness of the films which are understood to have cost \$30, U. S. currency in rental alone. When all expenses are considered such a programme will exceed \$40 local currency and it is a self-evident fact that the admission fee of 40 cents is barely, if at all sufficient to protect the business from loss. On Thursday evening a new serial entitled "The Lion's Paw" will be introduced and it is proposed to show "The Bull's Eye" and this serial alternately Monday and Thursday nights.
