TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Oct. 19th—Belief that the British Government and its representatives at the armament conference will work together with the other nations to reduce the burden of armaments, through the diminishing possible causes of war, was expressed by President Harding yesterday in a cablegram to King George. The President's cablegram was in reply to one received from the King yesterday, in which the British Ruler expressed his appreciation of the bestowal of the United States medal of honour on Britain's unknown warrior.

London, Oct. 19th—A committee of the Sinn Fein and British delegates to the Irish conference, which has been holding sessions here for the past week met at the Colonial Office yesterday to consider facilities that should be given the British air force in case an agreement should be reached on the Irish question. When Mr. Lloyd George made the original proposal on this subject the terms of which was the necessity of the air force having certain privileges in Ireland the Sinn Fein officials strongly objected, but it is understood they have since modified their views regarding the proposals with the result that the delegates yesterday met Mr. Churchill, Mr. Frederick August, Major Genl. Trenchard, Sir Laming Wothington-Evans and others interested in the air force, to discuss the matter. News from Ireland today tended to show that the Sinn Fein is intensifying its boycott against Belfast goods, despite the truce. Several large

shops accused of selling such goods are being picketed it was reported.

London, Oct. 19th.—Reviewing a rumour that Great Britain is preparing a new naval base in the South Pacific, the "Daily Sketch" says it is intended to spend £2,000,000 in converting Singapore into a first class station, while an alternative base of less importance is to be created in Australia. The "Sketch" adds that if an agreement is reached at the Washington conference, the arrangement can be countermanded. The newspaper further says that the Bermuda's are also to be converted into a first class base, which suggests cooperation with the United States.

London, Oct. 19th.—Lord Robert Cecil, in opening yesterday a national campaign in behalf of funds for the League of Nations Union, announced that Lord Cowdray had promised to contribute 50,000 pounds. He read a letter from the Marquis of Landsdowne strongly advocating arbitration in international disputes, instead of resorting to force. Viscount Grey, former Secretary for Foreign Affairs, spoke in support of the League of Nations and congratulated the British and French Premiers for having resorted to the League in the Silesian deadlock. If the League solved that question, he said, it would achieve a great triumph.

Washington, Oct. 19th—The Senate last night ratified the treaty of peace with Germany with the reservations reported by the foreign relations committee. The vote was 66 for ratification to 20 against, or more than the necessary two thirds majority. Fourteen Democratic Senators voted in favour of ratification and two Republican Senators, Mr. Borah of Idaho and Mr. Lafollette of Wisconsin, voted against it. A third republican Senator, Mr. Norris of Nebraska who was absent on account of sickness was paired against the treaty, soon afterwards the Senate ratified the peace treaty with Austria by the same vote. Another and similar Peace Treaty with Hungary also was ratified completing the administrations immediate peace programme with the former central powers.

London, Oct. 19th. The Munich correspondent of the Times is informed by an unnamed expert that the Germans have perfected a triple barrelled machine gun, electrically operated, weighing some twenty two lbs., and capable of spraying two thousand rounds per minute in a complete circle. The three barrels could be operated by a gunner one and a half mile distant. This is cited as instancing how German industries are devising engines of war, and the correspondent further declared that chemists are conducting researches into poisonous gases and bacteriological possibilities of destruction.
