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Monday night Socialists attempted to invade a church in a popular quarter, but did not succeed in breaking through the doors. They postponed the undertaking for another date when the paper asserts they will make the attempt to occupy the Lateran Palace which was once the residence of the Pope. The Osservatore Romano also asserts that Socialists are threatening to invade the Catholic club and nurseries.

London, Sept. 22nd.—The attempted invasion of religious edifices in Rome is in part a movement among persons unable to obtain dwellings owing to the shortage in house accommodation to seize unoccupied homes and other buildings and install themselves, according to a despatch to the London News from Rome. The despatch says that on Tuesday night quite a number of such buildings were occupied. The police in some instances evicted the invaders and the Government is prepared to prevent invasion of churches and church property.

Paris, Sept. 22nd.—Two of the candidates who were prominently mentioned as possible successors to M. Deschanel as President of the Republic have declared themselves out of the running. These men were M. Leon Bourgeois and M. Raoul Perst respectively of the Senate and Chamber of Deputies.

London, Sept. 22nd.—No progress was made today towards a settlement of the coal miners dispute although among the more optimistic, hope has been revived from the fact that a meeting of the "Triple Alliance" has been called for Thursday to hear the reply of Mr. Lloyd George to the Committee of Alliance which visited him late today. The reply of the Premier was a reiteration of the proposal made to the miners executive committee the previous day that there being a difference of opinion between the miners and the Government as to facts and figures the question of an increase of wages should be referred to an impartial tribunal or as an alternative the miners should consent to work out with the colliery owners and the Government, some scheme whereby in return for increased production the miners could get increased wages. The Premier considered that by the alternative proposal, the miners would get a greater increase than they demand, while the country also would benefit. To this Mr. Smillie, the miners leader replied "we are as anxious as you to increase the output, but you can only get that if you have the good will and desire to increase it." In opening the conference Mr. Smillie pressed the necessity of the increase being conceded if the miners were to maintain the standard of life which all desired they should Mr. Thomas, for the railway men and Mr. Gosling, for the transport workers,

announced that their unions were in full sympathy with the miners, who they considered had made out their case for an increase. In a further report to the Premier, Mr. Smillie said that the colliery owners had expressed the view that the advance should be granted and that the committees good will would set up every promise of an increased output, which they would work for. It was not in their power however to give a definite pledge for an increased output, as obstacles might be placed in their way. Mr. Hodges, another of the miners delegates said that the proposition as it now stood, was one which could not take the place of the application for an advance. After the conference the triple alliance committee met and decided to call a full meeting of the three organizations for Thursday.
