Hamilton Bermuda, July 9th.—The steamship "Vauban", from Buenos Aires June 21st for New York, went on the rocks in the Bermuda Channel early today.

Hamilton, July 10th.—An unsuccessful effort was made at high tide yesterday afternoon to refloat the steamship "Vauban" of the Lamport and Holt Line, which went on a reef in Bermuda channel early yesterday morning. It was discovered that part of the cargo must be discharged before the ship can be refloated. At the point where the "Vau-

ban" struck, near number six buoy, the current is very swift and she blocked the channel, making impossible the entry of the "Fort St George" which was due here yesterday morning, as was the "Chaudiere" from Halifax to the West Indies, which is also outside the harbour. Divers reported last night that the "Vauban" was not damaged to any extent and that she is in no danger. This information was given to the passengers who have remained aboard, but who will probably be taken ashore today for a sightseeing tour of the island, while the cargo is discharged. The "Vauban" was in charge of a Bermuda pilot when it went on the rocks.

(Later). New York, July 10th.—The steamship "Vauban" which went on the rocks off Bermuda yesterday was floated at six o'clock this morning and apparently is undamaged, said a cablegram received by the Lamport and Holt Line. She will stop at Hamilton to store her bar supplies and then proceed to New York arriving Friday.

Lausanne, July 8th.—The Turkish delegation to the Lausanne peace conference stated yesterday that it had received no advices regarding a reported clash between Greek and Turkish troops at Kara Burnu. The opinion was expressed by the Turkish representatives that the report was erroneous.

Berlin, July 7th.—The Vossische Zeitung reports that the French had occupied the Duisburg branch of the Reichsbank and seized about seventy million marks.

Madrid, July 7th.—General Aguila, a prospective military dictator, is expected to make his d'etat today. He apparently has the entire army with him. The Government seems afraid to interfere. "I will not tolerate interruption," he warned the Senators "what I say here is awaited impatiently outside."

Belgrade, July 9th.—The Roumanian Jugo Slav defence alliance has been renewed for three years in a protocol signed at Bucharest.

Rome, July 9th.—A semi official communication was issued by the Vatican on Saturday as follows: "The Holy See, which has already deplored the Duisburg outrage because such incidents render more difficult the work of pacification, has instructed the Nuncio in Paris and Brussels to approach the respective Governments so that the rigorous measures proclaimed against Germany, may be averted for the final purpose of obtaining an understanding between Germany and Belgium."

Melbourne, July 9th.—The Premier of Australia, in a speech today, said that after the Imperial Conference was finished he intended to visit all the great cities in every part of the British Isles in order to stir up Great Britain's imagination about the possibilities of Australia for the absorption of British immigrants and as a market for the products of the Motherland.
